

"All they had was this itty bitty camera, and when you have a camera that (isn't a professional camera), when you turn it on in a black theatre with a bright stage, everything up there is a ghost. People have no faces, and it's just blobs moving around," Haddican said. "So I brought in my equipment and did the lighting the way it should be, and when you watch it, you can actually see everything the way it should be — with colors and flesh tones. They were very pleased with that and wanted to make sure I would continue to do it. And I said, 'Sure. It's a service

to the community.³ Since then, Haddican has

seeing that and putting it all together."

Haddican said it's also interesting to monitor the reactions of the performers when they watch their own work.

"When it's done, they watch it and you get to see how excited they get and they're surprised because they thought they did a terrible job, and it actually looks pretty good," he said. "That's pretty cool.'

Having served the theatre for several years, Haddican said he has witnessed several memorable moments, but one in particular stands out as the most dramatic.

"During 'Willy Wonka and the Chocolate Factory,' there was a scene in the second act where they all huddled together in the center to go through a particular sequence, and there's a trap door in the center of the stage that has hydraulics to go up and down. The whole thing broke, and about six to eight people went down under stage, landing on top of each other," he said.

"Somebody questioned if they should stop the show, and the orchestra stopped for a little bit. (But) then they started playing again, and people actually started crawling out from under the stage in character. There were maybe a couple of scrapes and bruises, but nobody was date. hurt, and they just kept right on going and finished the show. They got one of the biggest standing ovations I'd ever seen." Along with recording play performances, Haddican also offers additional services to the theatre, such as operating the sound system during shows. He also installed the theatre's current sound system that features a hearing-impaired system for the elderly.

Deadline Approaching For ACT Prep Course

WAGNER — The 18th annual Wagner Area ACT Test Prep Course will be offered this spring for students planning to take the ACT exam. The 18-hour class begins March 12.

This course is designed to help students gain more confidence and to be better prepared for the April and June ACT test dates. The course offers students the opportunity to thoroughly prepare for the exam by providing instruction on test strategies, question and answer opportunities, test practice in Reading, Science, English and Math, and a complete test simulation prior to the April test

The primary goal of this kind of course is to increase a student's confidence level and improve their chances of getting a better ACT composite score. Many students who take this course often sign up to take the exam in Wagner, as well. A limited number of students who may enroll in the six-session course, and the application deadline is March 2. Haddican said what he enjoys most about filming the shows is the challenge of creating the best product possible.



CHICAGO (AP) - Grains futures mostly rose Thursday on the Chicago Board of Trade.

Wheat for March delivery fell 2.75 cents to \$6.4175 a bushel; March corn rose 1.25 cents to \$6.3950 a bushel; March oats rose 1.25 cent to \$3.2050 a bushel; while March soybeans rose 4.50 cents to \$12.7675 a bushel. Beef and pork futures fell on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange. April live cattle fell 1.48 cent to \$1.2967 a pound; March feeder cattle fell 0.77 cent to \$1.5765 a pound; while April lean hogs fell 0.72 cent to 89.60 cents a pound.
