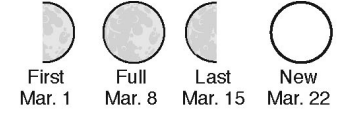

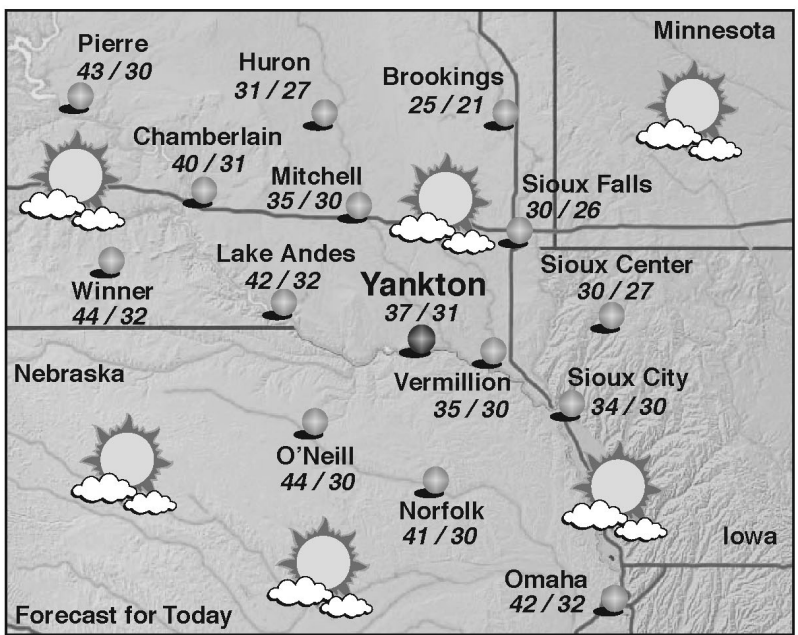

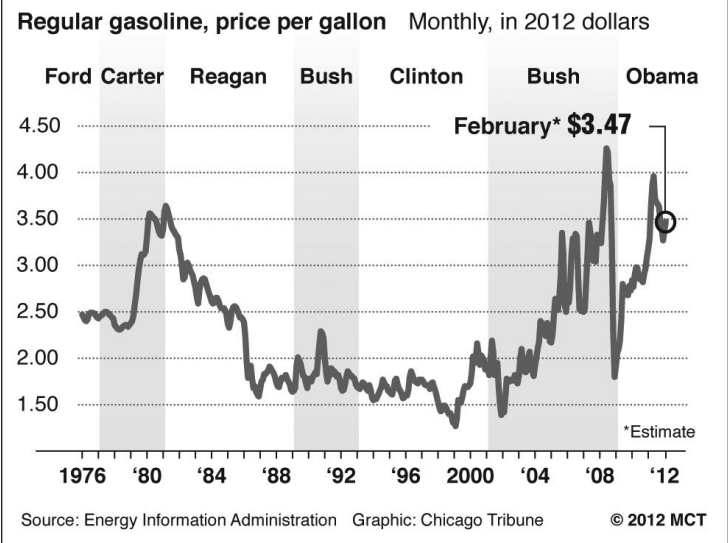

The price of gasoline, which is made from crude oil, has soared as oil prices rise. The national average jumped by nearly 12 cents per gallon in a week, with state averages above \$4 per gallon in California, Alaska and Hawaii.
It looks like they'll keep climbing.
Tom Kloza, publisher and chief oil analyst at Oil Price Information Service, said pump prices will add at least another 10 to 15 cents per gallon in coming days to reflect a recent jump in wholesale markets. The national average will likely peak in late April, Kloza said, rising as high as \$4.25 per gallon.
The rise will weigh on the economy, pushing leisure and business travel costs higher. Every one-cent increase in the price of gasoline costs the economy \$1.4 billion, analysts say.
Prices have been surging particularly on the West Coast where a BP refinery was shut down after a fire. That refinery in Blaine, Wash., is the third-largest on the West Coast with a produc-

tion capacity of 230,000 barrels per day.
The fire comes at a tough time for the refining industry. Most refiners are already slowing production to get ready for a switch over from winter to more expensive summer fuel blends. The seasonal switch usually creates a temporary dip in supplies that

pushes prices higher at this time of year. The loss of the BP refinery could make that dip even deeper.
Gasoline has become a major political issue this year as prices tick higher.
Some lawmakers have called on the Obama administration to release more oil from emergency

stockpiles in the Strategic Petroleum Reserve, but analysts say that would be ineffective. The government tried that last summer after the Libyan uprising forced that country's oil fields to shut down. Prices dipped slightly, but they eventually rebounded and are now close to last year's peak.
Independent oil analyst Andrew Lipow pointed out that the U.S. has adequate oil supplies right now, and a release of extra supplies wouldn't make much sense. Traders are mostly concerned with how the Iran situation will affect supplies this summer. Nobody's sure what will happen, Lipow said, and that is pushing investors to buy more oil as an insurance policy against a major conflict.
"It's just unclear how this plays out," Lipow said. "The worry is that Iran will be forced into a position that they try to impact their neighbors in some way" and curtail oil production in the entire region.
In other energy trading, heating oil rose by a penny to \$3.31 per gallon, while gasoline futures rose by 3 cents to \$3.15 per gallon. Natural gas prices fell by 10 cents to \$2.52 per 1,000 cubic feet.

• Federal regulators, despite a chorus of protests, may move within days to cut state and local authorities out of decisions over whether nuclear power plants are worth the dangers they pose to populous areas. The Nuclear Regulatory Commission, host of an often fiery debate Tuesday over who bears final responsibility for the "peaceful" atom, is expected to vote by the end of the week on a staff proposal to restore nuclear sovereignty unto itself.
• The Menno Heritage Museum was recently named to the National Register of Historic Places. The Gottlieb Schmitt House, 150 W. Poplar qualified as a symbol of historic significance as it retains many of its original architectural features including frame siding, front porch with slender columns and narrow one-over-one sash rectangular windows. Menno's Historical Society purchased the house in 1983 and officially opened it to tourists in 1986.

jack, poker and slot machines, Eliason said. The higher limit could be applied to any or all of the games, he said.
"That decision would be made by casino management," he said.
Fort Randall currently operates seven blackjack tables and three poker tables. In addition, the casino offers a bingo hall, 250 slot machines classified as Class III, and 136 slot machines classified as Class II.
Aungie acknowledges that taking the next step to \$1,000 represents a major change.
One major operational concern would be housing the amount of cash needed to cover large payouts, she said. The casino would also likely set up a separate gaming area for high rollers to ensure greater privacy and security, she said.

A higher bet limit is not the only major change under consideration at Fort Randall, as the casino might seek to double its number of slot machines to 500, Aungie said.
"They let Flandreau (Royal River Casino) go to 500 slot machines because of the opening of Grand Falls Casino near Inwood, Iowa," she said. "It would be nice if we could get more Class III slot machines."
While the current state-YST compact contains a limit of 250 Class III slot machines, there are no limits on the number of blackjack and poker tables, Eliason said. Class II machines are not subject to a state-tribal gaming compact, he said.
The state-YST compact is subject to review every four years from its effective date. The current compact will remain in effect until May 4, 2013, Eliason said. Either party may give notice to the other party, 180 days prior to the end of the four-year period, of provisions it believes require review or amendment.

The higher bet limit and move to 500 slot machines, if added, would tie in well with the casino's expanded gaming area opened last June, Aungie said. The next phase of the project calls for a new convention center and hotel, along with upgrading the restaurant and lounge.
"We're looking at knowing a lot more in May, whether we get

a grant or loan from the Shakopee tribe," she said. "If we do get it, then we'll go through with the convention center and hotel."
