# **Jury Finds For University Of Iowa In Lawsuit**

IOWA CITY, Iowa (AP) — A jury has rejected a Michigan lawyer's claims that the University of Iowa's law school denied him a faculty position because it found him too old, siding with the school in one of three discrimination lawsuits that were making their way through the courts.

Donald Dobkin of West Bloomfield. Mich., sued the university in 2009 when he was 56, saying he was denied a position at the College of Law because of his age. He pointed out that the law school hadn't hired a faculty member older than 40 in the previous decade.

Geoff Greenwood, a spokesman for the Iowa Attorney General's Office, which represented the university, told the lowa City Press-Citizen for a story published Friday (http://icp-c.com/zo9wqr) that his office is pleased with the verdict. Dobkin could not be reached Sunday for comment.

Dobkin applied for a law professor po-sition at the school in 2008. The position called for experience in administrative, immigration, international and criminal law.

Dobkin had more than 25 years' experience leading the largest independent immigration firm in Michigan, a law degree from Northwestern University and had written numerous journal articles.

Dobkin had sought a position on the law school faculty and compensation for lost wages.

The law school faces two other lawsuits alleging discrimination in the school's hiring practices.

# **Neb. Lawmakers Turn To Budget Decisions**

LINCOLN, Neb. - With a new revenue outlook predicting no additional tax money, Nebraska Gov. Dave Heineman and lawmakers this week will being working to decide what they can afford of a wish list that includes millions for tax relief, child welfare reforms and other proposed incentives.

Heineman has insisted that his \$327 million tax cut package should be the Legislature's top priority. The three-year plan would cost roughly \$52 million for this budget period, eating up a large chunk of the \$63 million that is available under the Appropriations Committee's tentative budget.

Heineman's administration has also requested \$19.7 million to lower the caseload ratio for social workers in Nebraska, as part of the state's effort to reform its child welfare system.

Other proposed spending includes tax breaks for wind farms and agriculture companies plus millions for new medical facilities in Lincoln, Omaha and Kearney.

On Friday, the Nebraska Economic Forecasting Advisory Board voted unanimously to stick with its October projections for the two-year budget period that ends in June 2013. That means lawmakers won't have extra money to work with as they figure out the state's budget.

"I was hoping it wouldn't have been flat,

#### but we're still doing better than so many other states," said Bellevue Sen. Abbie Cornett, chairwoman of the Legislature's Revenue Committee.

Cornett said she will meet this week with Speaker Mike Flood and leaders of the Revenue and Education committees to discuss the budget. She said it was too soon to know specifics about the budget that will emerge. Even with the forecast in hand, some said

it still will be hard to figure out a budget. Omaha Sen. Jeremy Nordquist, a member of the Appropriations Committee, said lawmakers still have to pay for the "core functions" of government, which could include increased Medicaid costs caused by changes in the eligibility rules, state aid for K-12

schools and child welfare reforms. All those costs are in flux.

Lawmakers and the governor rely on the board's projections when setting the state's two-year budget. Board members predicted in October that the state would collect nearly \$52 million in additional revenue for the fiscal year that ends June 30, and roughly \$62 million in the following fiscal year.

The forecasting board's members said Nebraska's strong farm economy was partially offset by weak retail sales and low housing values. But they said some of Nebraska's largest cities — Omaha, Lincoln and Kearney — were faring well and trying to recruit work-ers for unfilled positions.




