S.F. Flyers Blank Oahe 2-0 For State Title

Sticking to the game plan led the Sioux Falls Flyers to a 19-1-0 record, and the title of State Champions at the S.D. State Girls JV Hockey Tournament.

Sioux Falls edged out the Oahe Capitals 2-0 on Sunday afternoon. The Flyers took 42 shots-on-goal, compared to Oahe's eight shots-ongoal.

"Our game plan was to keep pressuring on offense and take as many shots as possible," Sioux Falls head coach Brian Wrightsman said. "I told the girls if it was going to take 50 shots to beat this team. that's exactly what we were going to do. We took 42 shots and that worked out to be enough.'

In the first period the Flyers came out firing. Sioux Falls took six shots-on-goal in the first two minutes of play. Oahe's goalie, Tessa Singleton deflected and stopped all six shots. Singleton continually handled the Sioux Falls attack throughout the first period. Sioux Falls took 17 shots-on-goal in the opening period, but was not able to find the net on any of their at-

tempts. The Capitals took four shots-on-goal in the first period, with no goals.

In the second period, the Flyers continued to threaten to score, but each time was held scoreless by Singleton and the Capitals. With seven minutes left in the period, two Oahe players were sent to the penalty box, leaving only four Capitals on the ice. Sioux Falls did the best they could to take advantage of the penalties, but could not convert.

The first penalized Capital left the box to strengthen the Oahe defense, but as the penalty time ran out for the second penalized Capital, Sioux Falls finally broke through into the net.

With 5:11 left in the second period, Oahe was barely getting back to full strength when Maggie Drexler finally broke the scoreless tie right in front of the Sioux Falls crowd. The Flyers' section of the stands erupted in cheers as Mollie Drexler and Madison Elkins assisted in the goal.

Neither team was able to score for the rest of the period. Sioux Falls took 14 shots-on-goal in the second period, while Oahe took two shots-on-goal in the period.

The Capitals were being outshot by 25 shots heading into the final period, but found themselves only down by a single goal. The game was well within reach for the Capitals.

With 3:34 left on the clock, Alex Bettmeng of the Flyers sent a perfect pass from behind the net to Jennika Wrightsman, who was directly in front of the goal. Wrightsman took the pass and flipped the puck into the net. With a two-goal advantage and only a few minutes left on the clock the Flyers knew they had clinched the game, and the state title.

Sioux Falls took 11 shots-ongoal in the period, compared to Oahe's two shots-on-goal in the period.

"It feels pretty good to win this one. It was a tough game," Brian Wrightsman said. "It has been a long time coming. Our program has been down for the past two or three years, but now we have a state championship, and have a chance to continue winning because about 75 percent of our team is eighth-graders."

Oahe head coach, Christy Hock-

ett also reflected on the game. "It was a good game," Hockett said. "If we could have had a few more bumps or shots to go our way we could've come out with a win. I am very proud of our team" The play of Oahe's Singleton

stood out in the game. "She is one of the better goalies in the state, if not the best,

Wrightsman said. Šingleton stopped 40 shots in the game.

"It was an intense game with a lot of shots taken," Singleton said. "I felt good about how I played, and I am glad I had my teammates there to help me stop their shots."

The play of Sioux Falls' goalie Cassie Nack was also impressive. "I can't say enough about

Cassie," Wrightsman said. "She pitched back-to-back shutouts in the state tournament.'

For the weekend, Nack had 21 shots taken on her, and 21 saves. Jennika Wrightsman ended the tournament with four points (three goals and one assist), in only two games.

"I am very excited and just really happy to have won," Jennika Wrightsman said. "I am proud of my team.

When asked about her outstanding performance during the weekend, Wrightsman replied: "I am proud of myself. It makes

me feel like I was part of the championship in a big way," Wrightsman said.

Oahe ends their season as the state runners-up, and a record of 14-6-1-0.

"It was a good season for us," Singleton said. "We came into the tournament in third place, and ended in second place.'

Dunbar finished the tourney with a .918 save percentage on 56 saves off of 61 shots on goal.

With the victory, Watertown wins the consolation title and fifth place overall in the tournament.

ABERDEEN - The Pierre Governors became the first Eastern South Dakota and first East River wrestling program to win a Class A title since 2003 when it beat out Huron, Rapid City Central and Sturgis for top honors in the South Dakota State Class A Tournament on Saturday at the Barnett Center on the Northern State University campus.

Pierre finished at 158 points with Huron 145 and Rapid City Central 143. Sturgis finished fourth at 132.5, followed by Mitchell (110) and defending champion Rapid City Stevens (102).

Since Watertown won the Class B title in 2003, Sturgis won five titles, Stevens won two and Winner won once.

Led by the Lambert twins, Dakota Valley finished at 40 points. Tanner Lambert led the way, upending Stevens' Cody Benne for the heavyweight title. Taylor Lambert finished sixth at 220 pounds.

Vermillion finished with 37 points, as Brett Bye — upset in the semifinals for his only loss of the season — finished third at 132 pounds with a major decision over Rapid City Central's Evan Weiler. Teammate Will Mart finished fourth, pinned by Rapid City Central's Jake Weber at heavyweight.

Yankton finished with 35.5 points, led by Logan Smith's third place finish at 145 pounds. Smith beat out Dell Rapids' Tyler Gee, who handed Smith a semifinal setback, by injury default. Also for Yankton, Casey
