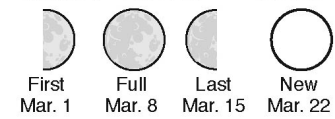

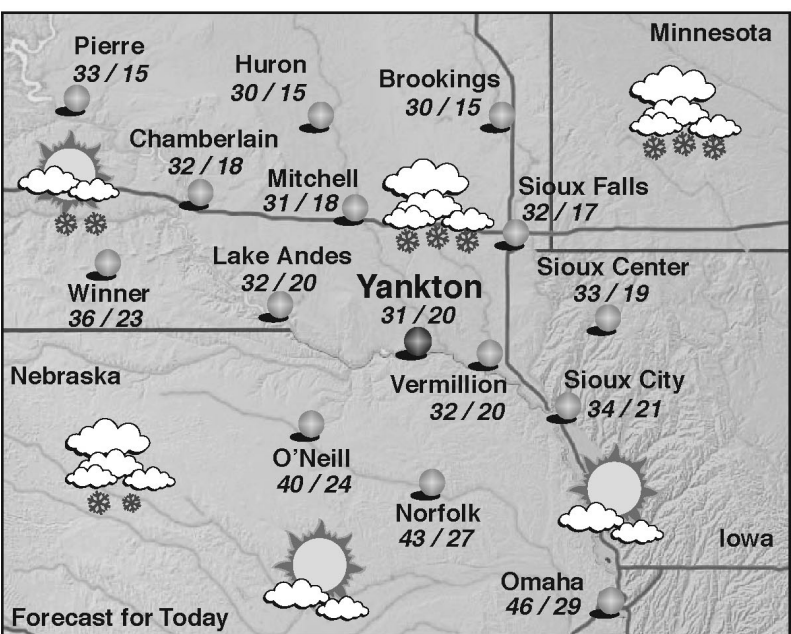

LINCOLN, Neb. — Troopers and Communication Specialists with the Nebraska State Patrol will put in overtime hours as part of high visibility enforcement efforts planned in conjunction with the Girls and Boys State Basketball Tournaments in Lincoln. operating expenses, partly offsetting cuts in state aid made in the current budget year. The measure also would provide \$1.5 million in state funds, along with some matching money, to nursing homes and other facilities that provide medical services and other care to low-income people and the disabled in the Medicaid program. That could provide people who work in those facilities a bonus equal to about 5 percent of their

The exception was northeastern South Dakota in areas such as Aberdeen and Watertown. That corner of the state was still expected to get between six and 12 inches of snow. Parts of Minnesota were also expected to see fluffier accumulation, Hanko said. The Dakotas have enjoyed a relatively balmy, dry winter until the past couple of weeks. "We've just been lucky with (storms) going to the north and south of us," Jimmy Taeger, a weather service meteorologist in
