

Neb. Man Sentenced In Child Sex Assaults

OMAHA, Neb. (AP) — An Omaha man charged with sexually assaulting boys who worked for his lawn care company has been sentenced to at least 195 years in prison.
The Omaha World-Herald reports 63-year-old Daniel Mangiameli was sentenced Monday to 195 to 310 years in prison.
Mangiameli is accused of having sexual relationships with dozens of boys over 30 years. He recently told probation officers he probably had 40 relationships. He was charged with the sexual assaults of four boys because of statutes of limitations.
Prosecutors say Mangiameli gave the boys alcohol, cigarettes and marijuana. They also say he took nude pictures of some of the boys.
Mangiameli has said he doesn't believe he did anything wrong. But he told a judge Monday that he had established a relationship with God in jail.

3 People Die In Northeast Nebraska Accidents

NORFOLK, Neb. (AP) — Authorities are investigating three separate crashes that killed three people in northeast Nebraska.
All of the accidents happened between Friday morning and Sunday. The Nebraska State Patrol says 20-year-old Joshua Lytle of Page died early Saturday when the vehicle he was riding in rolled over at a rural intersection west of Newman Grove. Two others in the vehicle were hurt.
A few hours later 33-year-old Samuel Hobbs of Ewing died after losing control of his vehicle. The vehicle rolled near a bridge over U.S. Highway 275 east of Ewing.
Brian Chase was killed Friday three miles west of Newcastle. The Dixon County Sheriff's office says the 48-year-old Newcastle man was a passenger in a car that struck a tree. The driver was flown to a Sioux City hospital.

HURON (AP) — State Fair organizers have announced the theme and logo for this year's event.
The theme for the fair will be "Starry Nights and Midway Lights." State Fair Manager Jerome Hertel says organizers chose the theme to play off of the carnival and entertainment lineup in the marketing. The 2013 State Fair will run from Aug. 29 to Sept. 2.
Concert announcements will be released starting the week of Feb. 11.

President Of Hastings College Leaving

HASTINGS, Neb. (AP) — The president of Hastings College in south-central Nebraska has resigned after only 18 months on the job, and his replacement has already been selected.
Hastings radio station KHAS/KCIS reported that Dennis Trotter had stepped down, citing an emailed news release from the college.
The release also said the vice president for college advancement, Don Jackson, had been named to immediately succeed Trotter.
College communications manager Alicia O'Donnell said Monday that she didn't know why Trotter had resigned and that, to her knowledge, his resignation letter didn't give his reasons.
Trotter began his Hastings College work on July 1, 2011, replacing Phil Dudley.
Hastings College has about 1,200 students and is a private, four-year liberal arts college affiliated with the Presbyterian Church (USA).

Reservation Dental Care Gets \$3.3M Boost

SIoux FALLS (AP) — Dental care specialists hope a \$3.3 million federal grant will help improve oral health on the American Indian reservations in South Dakota.
Officials have hired seven dental hygienists to serve tribal members and plan to hire 15 health coordinators to provide support services, including public education.
The Argus Leader newspaper reports that the three-year grant for the "Circle of Smiles" project is from the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services. It was awarded to the Indian Health Service, the South Dakota Dental Association, the Great Plains Tribal Chairmen's Health Board and the nonprofit insurer Delta Dental of South Dakota.
Delta Dental expects to contribute an additional \$1 million for equipment, training and other expenses.

2 Wild Card 2 Tickets Sold In S.D. Worth \$6K

PIERRE (AP) — A Wild Card 2 ticket sold in Pierre is worth \$6,001 in Saturday's drawing and another sold in Canton is worth \$6,000.
South Dakota lottery officials say each of the two tickets matched all five white ball numbers but missed the Wild Card to win the game's \$6,000 second prize. The ticket sold in Pierre also won another \$1 on another play line.
The odds of winning the prize are one in about 127,000. The winners have about six months to claim the money.
Wild Card 2 is played in the Dakotas, Montana and Idaho. The jackpot is at \$750,000 for the next drawing, which is on Wednesday.

Tougher Teen Driver Rules OK'd

PIERRE — South Dakota lawmakers sought to protect young drivers Monday with a package of recommendations that would ban beginning drivers from using cellphones behind the wheel and make other changes aimed at reducing teen traffic fatalities and serious injuries.
The Senate Transportation Committee voted 7-1 to approve a measure that would prohibit all beginning drivers from using cellphones or other electronic devices until they can get an unrestricted driver's license at age 16. At least 30 states and the District of Columbia have already banned the use of all

cellphones by novice drivers.
In 10 states and the District of Columbia, all drivers are prohibited from using handheld cellphones while driving. The South Dakota Legislature has repeatedly rejected measures to ban cellphone use or texting by all drivers, but members of the committee said it's time to take phones out of the hands of beginning drivers.
The committee also recommended that those with learners' permits should have to wait longer before driving unaccompanied. Another measure would set up a coordinated drivers' education system with statewide standards for course content, instruction, testing and certification of instructors.
The proposals, which now go to the full

Senate, were recommended by a Teen Driving Task that was set up two years ago by the Legislature.
Sen. Craig Tieszen, R-Rapid City, the chairman of the task force, said South Dakota is one of only a few states that allow 14-year-olds to begin driving with learners' permits, a tradition based on the need for teenagers to drive on farms. Many states require young drivers to be 15 or older to get learners' permits.
Tieszen said young drivers should not use cellphones because they are inexperienced and can have trouble dealing with distractions.
"Although some 14-year-olds are capable

Obama Stumps For Gun Legislation In Minnesota

MINNEAPOLIS — President Barack Obama declared Monday on his first trip outside Washington to promote gun control that a consensus is emerging for universal background checks for purchasers, though he conceded a tough road lay ahead to pass an assault weapons ban over formidable opposition in Congress.
"We should restore the ban on military-style assault weapons and a 10-round limit for magazines," Obama said in a brief speech, standing firm on his full package on gun-control measures despite long odds. Such a ban "deserves a vote in Congress because weapons of war have no place on our streets or in our schools or threatening our law enforcement officers."
The president spoke from a special police operations center in a city once known to some as "Murderapolis" but where gun violence has dropped amid a push to address it from city leaders. Officers stood behind him, dressed in crisp uniforms of blue, white and brown.
The site conveyed Obama's message that a reduction in violence can be achieved nationally, even if Americans have sharp disagreements over gun con-

trol. That includes among members of his own party in Washington.
Suggesting he won't get all he's proposing, he said, "We don't have to agree on everything to agree it's time to do something."
The president unveiled his gun-control plans last month after the shootings at a Newtown, Conn., elementary school. But many of the proposals face tough opposition from some in Congress and from the National Rifle Association.
Democratic Senate Majority Leader Harry Reid has said he wants to give the bans on assault weapons and high-capacity magazines a vote. But he will not say whether he will support either, and advocates and opponents alike predict they are unlikely to pass.
Putting the controversial measures up for a vote could put some Democratic senators in a tough spot. That includes some from conservative-leaning states who are up for re-election next year and face the prospect of voting against either fervent gun-rights supporters or Obama and gun-control supporters in the party's base.

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Heineman Says He Confronted Sheehy

LINCOLN, Neb. — Gov. Dave Heineman acknowledged Monday that he had previously confronted Lt. Gov. Rick Sheehy about rumors related to women, but that he didn't have enough information to act until phone records revealed Sheehy had made thousands of calls to women other than his wife.
Sheehy resigned Saturday morning after "new and more" information came to the governor's attention on Friday, Heineman said. A doctor from Bellevue has since confirmed that she and the lieutenant governor engaged in a romantic relationship that began shortly after they met in 2008. Sheehy's wife of 29 years filed for divorce last July.
"I don't act on rumors," Heineman said at a press conference Monday. "Every time I was aware of something of a serious nature, I checked into it."
Asked whether he had confronted Sheehy in the past about rumors related to women, Heineman said: "Let's just say we've had a conversation or two and leave it at that."
Sheehy resigned in the wake of a month-long investigation by the Omaha World-Herald. The newspaper reported that Sheehy made more than 2,300 calls on a state-issued cellphone to four women, other than his wife, over the past four years.
Sheehy's absence forces Heineman to appoint a new lieutenant governor to oversee the state's homeland security and information technology programs, and to attend public events on the governor's behalf. The lieutenant governor also presides over the Legislature on many days when lawmakers are in session.
Heineman told reporters that it's "very, very, very unlikely" that he'll replace Sheehy with a person who wants to take over as governor in 2015. Sheehy, a Republican, confirmed that he had planned to compete in that race and was endorsed by Heineman at the time.
Heineman said he doesn't want to give an advantage to any possible candidates in the Republican primary race. He also said he will appoint a replacement before the legislative session ends, which eliminates any current state senators.
"Given the circumstances, let's just let the competitive primary process work," Heineman said. "I just can't imagine I'm going to go against that. I guess I can leave myself a little wiggle room, but it's very, very, very unlikely that that will happen."
Heineman said he also plans to spend the week focused on his tax overhaul proposal. He is set to present two options to a legislative committee on Wednesday and Thursday.
