HELENA, Mont. (AP) – Lawmakers in at least 11 states are looking at plans to restrict the use of drones over their skies amid concerns the unmanned aerial vehicles could be exploited to

spy on Americans. The American Civil Liberties Union says state legislators are proposing various

restrictions on local authorities' use of the technology. Concerns mounted after the Federal Aviation Administration began establishing safety standards for civilian drones, which are becoming increasingly affordable and small in size.

Some police agencies have said the drones could be used for surveillance of suspects, search and rescue operations, and gathering details

on damage caused by natural disasters. In Montana, a libertarianminded state that doesn't even let police use remote cameras to issue traffic tickets, Democrats and Republicans are banding together to back multiple proposals re-

stricting drone use. They say drones, most often associated with overseas wars, aren't welcome in Big Sky Country.

"I do not think our citizens would want cameras to fly overhead and collect data on our lives," Republican state Sen. Matthew Rosendale told a legislative panel on Tuesday.

Rosendale is sponsoring a measure that would only let law enforcement use drones with a search warrant, and would make it illegal for private citizens to spy on neighbors with drones. The full Montana Senate endorsed a somewhat

broader measure Tuesday that bans information collected by drones from being used in court. It also would bar local and state government ownership of drones equipped with weapons, such as stunning devices. The ACLU said the states

won't be able to stop federal agencies or border agents from using drones. But the Montana ban would not allow



taxpayers and using them toward preservation of buildings that may have some historical significance for South Dakota but would primarily benefit Yankton.

"You're not going to have tourists coming to the HSC campus as a destination," Daugaard said. "Maybe for the Mead Building if we're lucky, but even for that, I don't think they are going to. I think I have to be sensitive to the fact that every dollar to propose restoration of a historic building in Yankton is a dollar we could spend on education, transportation or other important things for our state. When those buildings were built ... all of the interior walls were masonry walls that are load-bearing in many cases. If they are not load-bearing, they are very difficult to move because it is a concrete block wall."

Developers have toured some of the buildings in recent weeks and said as

much, according to the governor.

'They are people who have done redevelopment work, and they have shook their heads because there is no way to practically use these buildings," Daugaard stated.

That being said, he was excited about the Yankton County Historical Society's interest in making the Mead Building a museum and cultural center.

"I've been in it a number of times, and that marble staircase is just spectacular," Daugaard stated. "When (the Historical Society) became interested in restoration and the millions of dollars that will take, I was pleased and hopeful. Not confident, but hopeful. I'm optimistic about what will become of the Mead Building. It is well on its way to at least being protected from the elements. That goes a long way."

But despite the effort under way to bring new life to the Mead Building, he believes there are limited resources to undertake similar work elsewhere on campus.

"To say that can be done to all of those buildings is unrealistic," Daugaard said. "Moreover, many of those buildings are an attractive nuisance to trespassers and kids. I think it's time

needed for staff members?" he asked. "What happens when the trained staff member takes employment elsewhere?

Vlasman also asked who would own the weapon - would it be the individual or the district? Also, who is liable for the employee that is trained?

"I believe that a majority of our school district staff members would not feel comfortable serving as a sentinel, but there probably are some that would consider it," he said. we come to grips with that and recognize it for what it is. We have to say, These buildings cannot be rehabilitated. We should take them down.' Maybe the land can be redeveloped by a private sector enterprise. Certainly, when the HSC campus was created, it was a lot further away from Yankton than it is today. Yankton has come to join it. There is some value to that land, and hopefully that is something we can take advantage of."

Daugaard also spoke about his corrections reform legislation and why he opposes an expansion of Medicaid.

Also Monday, during a meeting with state Game, Fish and Parks officials, the delegation was told that Russell Marsh, who leases the Lewis and Clark Marina from the State of South Dakota, would like to get out of that agreement.

school sentinel program is the answer. Rather, I would like the Legislature to provide the funding so that schools can make a serious effort to hire resource officers and communities to hire mental health experts."

Christensen said every teacher he has heard from is against having guns in schools and believes schools will be no safer if the bill passes.

McIntosh agreed, saying he believes most teachers and administrators feel they do not have the skill set or mental preparation to be put in such a position.

"I do not believe that a person who is in the state of mind to shoot defenseless children would be deterred by this law," he said. "They would find other opportunities like waiting for recess, a ball game, lunch hour or some other opportunity."
