The 6-3 Hunhoff said that he also talked to Northern State during the recruiting process, but decided on the Jackrabbits be-cause of SDSU's culture and coaching staff.

"The main factor was the at-mosphere up there," Hunhoff said. "When I visited campus it felt like home. All of the coaches gave me a really good feeling."

Hunhoff said that he is anxiously waiting to sign his letter of intent so that he can receive the SDSU official workout program and start working towards his goal of playing for the Jackrabbits.

Stiegelmeier said that there were many positives in looking at Hunhoff as a potential player.

'Number one, Troy wants to be here. He's got a bright future,' he said. "He has the support of his family, a good frame ... a lot of positives.

Hunhoff's abilities as a punter his all-state selection was at that position — will also provide a bonus for the Jackrabbits.

Special teams guys at our level, it's hard to zero in on," Stiegelmeier said. "If you have a guy coming in at a position, who can also potentially punt, kick or snap, it is a huge positive."

"Troy needs to get bigger. When we had him in camp his speed was close, so we'll work in his speed," he said. "But from what I've seen of him, he's going to do those things he needs to do. He's going to work

hard." Joining Hunhoff will be teammate and fellow All-State and All-ESD selection, Kellen Soulek.

Soulek also plans to walk on to the Jackrabbits and will pursue a spot at defensive tackle.

"I am going up there (Brookings) when school starts and plan to redshirt and hopefully get some playing time by my second year,' Soulek said. "I want to get a good education and make friendships and have a good experience."

Likness called Soulek one of the best lineman that he has coached in over 30 years at the high school level.

"I think with his size and quickness, that he is a physical player that can explode off the line and rip through people and get to the ball," Likness said. "He can play down or up and is one of the better lineman that I've had in a long time.'

Joining Hunhoff and Soulek in Brookings will be another former Buck, Kellen's brother Ty, a transfer from Northern Iowa. Ty, another former All-State and All-ESD performer, received the OK from that coaching staff to transfer to Brookings.

Kellen said that his brother influenced his deci-


sion to attend SDSU and that he looks forward to playing alongside Ty once again.

"I love anything about special teams, I'm just glad it took me as far as it did," he said.

On the issue of 'far,' USD did not travel far from Vermillion to nab its most recruits. Nebraska led the way with five kids, followed by four each in Iowa, Illinois and Oklahoma (a recent hot-bed).

The recruits from Nebraska include Jackson Gannon (DL, Kearney), Jonathan Maag (OL, Scottsbluff), Luke Worden (DB. Scottsbluff), Colin Mertlik (LB, Blair) and Graham Resseguie (DB, Lincóln Pius X).

There were also two South Dakota kids, Sioux Falls Roosevelt linebacker John Wessel and Dakota Valley walk-on linebacker laylor Lambert Though the USD staff wanted to build depth across the board at every position, their "most urgent need" — as Glenn put it was signing a kicker. With Kevin Robb no longer with the program, the Coyotes turned their attention to Miles Bergner, of Longmont, Colo. The No. 15-rated kicker by scout.com, Bergner was selected to play in the U.S. Army All-America Bowl last month. He said he "thought long and hard" about an offer from the Air Force Academy but stuck with USD. "The potential to play right away in an amazing community with that much support is a huge deal," Bergner said. Of course, playing right away means the 6-1 kicker would directly involved in rebounding from a 1-win season. "I think what coach Glenn is doing is absolutely wonderful," Bergner said. "He's building the program for the future. I have full faith in what he does and what he wants to do.' Ultimately, the future is where the 2013 recruiting class will be evaluated. "You'll see in time, these are kids that are team captains, won state championships, and are going to help us," Glenn said. In all, there were 17 defensive and 13 offensive signees, as well as Bergner (a kicker/punter) and a listed "athlete" (Brandt Van Roekel, Boyden-Hull/Rock Valley, lowa). Breaking the class down even further:

• 4 walk-ons

• 5 recruits from Nebraska, 4 each from Iowa, Illinois and Oklahoma, 3 each from Colorado and Kansas, 2 each from South Dakota, California, Missouri and Florida, and 1 from Minnesota

• Only 1 quarterback: Aaron Ramsey, a 6-foot-3 kid from Stillwell, Kan. Combined for over 2,000 yards and 30 touchdowns as a senior in an option offense

• By positions: 7 defensive backs and linebackers, 6 defensive linemen, 5 offensive linemen, 2 wide receivers, and 1 quarterback, running back, fullback, kicker and a kicker
