• The Bookmobile which will be demonstrated in Bon Homme and Yankton counties by the South Dakota Library Commission for the next six months has arrived.

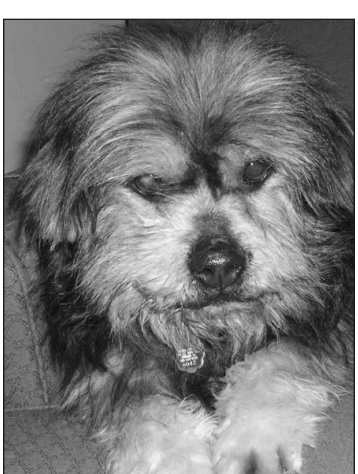
BOARD OF TRADE

Business Donating Money For YHS Student

One local downtown business is planning to celebrate the month of February in a different fashion. With Valentine's Day right around the corner you are always trying to find that special way to show someone how much you care. This makes us stop to think about all the times you hear on the news about people doing random acts of kindness for people they may not even know. As they call it "paying it forward". Some can reflect upon times they themselves have been on the receiving end of that act of kindness.  
Recently, Amber Larson, from Yankton Monument Company/Family Memorials by Gibson heard the news that Yankton High School students Tatum Draskovic, 17, was diagnosed with cancer.  
On Jan. 3, Tatum's mother,

Laura Coffman, took Tatum to the doctors and found out she had a large mass in her abdomen. She was then sent to Sioux Falls, where they discovered the large mass was a tumor, but they did not know was if the tumor was cancerous. Tatum has surgery on Jan. 7 Once in surgery the doctors determined that the tumor was actually Stage 3 Ovarian Cancer that had traveled to her bowels and abdomen.  
Though they are confident that they removed the whole tumor, Tatum will have to undergo four rounds of chemotherapy during the next 12 weeks and continue to

be checked to see if the cancer is going to grow back. On Monday Jan. 28, she started her first round of chemo.  
Tatum is a senior in high school. She has a passion for helping animals and once she graduates she is planning to go to school to become a veterinarian.  
Amber Larson, manager of Yankton Monument Company, said: "As a mother of two children, I could put myself in her family's shoes. Almost all of us have known someone that has gone through a serious illness and knows the financial burden it can cause. Even with good health insurance, it doesn't pay for all your expenses associated with treatment, especially when one family member has to take extended time off of work in order to take care of a loved

one. So with no hesitation we approached Tatum's family to see if we could help and that is how Team Tatum was started."  
To that end, Yankton Monument company is donating of portion of its February sales to Tatum's family to help cover their expenses.  
Larson added that a benefit banquet with a raffle is being planned for sometime in April.

ment Division.  
The Carryover Multiple Use Zone is designed to provide service to the eight Congressionally authorized purposes, though at reduced levels, through a 12-year drought like that of the 1930s and early 1940s.  
Gavins Point operations project manager Dave Becker couldn't be reached for comment Friday. However, Corps officials in Omaha said Gavins Point releases are scheduled at 14,000 cubic feet per second (cfs) through the end of February.  
Weather and river conditions will continue to be monitored, and additional release increases may be necessary on a temporary basis if extremely cold temperatures return, according to the Corps news release.  
Gavins Point releases averaged 14,800 cfs during the month of January. Releases were temporarily increased to 16,000 cfs in early February due to an ice jam on the Missouri River above Sioux City. No flooding resulted during the jam. The ice jam caused a temporary reduction in flows downstream of the jam, which resulted in a drop in stages.  
The reservoir behind Gavins Point Dam ended January at an elevation of 1,207.3 feet above mean sea level (msl). The reservoir will gradually be lowered to elevation 1,206 by the end of February to make room for potential spring runoff.  
Fort Randall releases averaged 12,100 cfs during January. Releases are expected to average near 11,000 cfs this month and will be adjusted as necessary to maintain the desired elevation at Gavins Point.  
The reservoir ended January at elevation 1,346.2 feet msl, up 6.2 feet during the month. It is expected to rise 3.8 feet by the end of the February. The refill of the reservoir is designed to provide in-

creased winter hydropower generation at Oahe and Big Bend.  
Additional precipitation — or lack of it — in the basin could cause adjustments to the reservoir release rates.  
Gavins Point releases will be stepped up in mid-March for the 2013 navigation season, which will open April 1 at the mouth near St. Louis.  
The current forecast indicates that minimum service flow support will be provided for navigation and other downstream uses during the first half of the navigation season.  
The Corps will set the level of flow support and season length for the second half of the navigation season following the system storage check on July 1.  
Meanwhile, Corps officials are monitoring mountain snowpack as an indicator of flows this spring and summer.  
Mountain snowpack is currently 96 percent of normal in the reach above Fort Peck and 89 percent in the reach between the Fort Peck and Garrison. Typically, 64 percent of the peak mountain snowpack accumulation has occurred by Feb. 1.  
The drought creates a larger impact on the three upstream reservoirs, Curran said.  
"The lower three — Lewis and Clark, Fort Randall and Big Bend — all run pretty normal year to year. We are pretty routine (at Pickstown)," he said. "The upper three are the ones that are impacted the most by drought or whatever else happens."  
The river remains open below Fort Randall dam, and the waterfowl numbers have remained strong, Curran said. As for the future, he isn't sure what to expect for the drought and its impact on river operations.  
"I have been (Fort Randall) project manager since 1999. It's the driest I have ever seen it," he said.  
"We have yet to see how long it lasts. I think that's the big question."
