## Yankton Area United Way Recognizes Clothing Closet Volunteers For Their Service

"My volunteers rock!!! They are always there no matter what, and can't thank them enough for all their hard work and dedication!" exclaims Leah Brandt, Coordinator of the Clothing Closet.

The Clothing Closet (CC) volunteers were honored as the February 2013 Volunteers of the Month by United Way (UW) and Volunteers Services of Greater Yankton.

The CC is an example of outstanding community collaboration. UW agencies identified the need. The South Dakota Human Services Center (HSC) had space. The Retired Senior Volunteer Program

(RSVP) has ongoing willing volunteer support.

The development of the CC filled a serious need in Yankton and discontinued a redundancy in services. Other local used clothing establishments typically offer only two free full sets of clothing per person in a lifetime. Few people needing clothing can make do with only two outfits until they get back on their feet. Various agencies had small areas for storing donated clothing. Those organizations needed the space and could not serve those in need from all other local agencies. HSC had a clothing

room for indigent patients. It was a natural fit to combine resources and then expand HSC clothing

room to serve the community. The CC opened in March of 2004, in the lower level of the Kyle Building on the HSC south campus. The Closet is open to the community on Tuesdays 12 noon to 5:30pm and Fridays from 12 noon to 4:30pm. The CC also serves HSC patients on the days when it is not open to the community. HSC Activities Center Mental Health Aide Leah Brandt also serves as the CC Coordinator.

The CC's success these past

nine years can be directly attributed to the dedicated volunteers. Leah explained, "Many volunteer 16 hours a month, some more... some less. Altogether, the CC volunteers donate 3,200 hours each year. They are all very dedicated workers!"

The CC is designed to provide for those people in the greatest need. Vouchers can be obtained from area churches, Contact Center, Women Center/Shelter , Family Visitation Center, RSVP, Big Friend-Little Friend, Head Start, Parents As Teachers, Social Services, United Way & Volunteer Services,

Lewis & Clark Behavioral Health Services, County Health, Just For Kids, Sacred Heart Monastery and other agencies that serve those in need. Other agencies that need vouchers may contact United Way at 665-6766.

The Clothing Closet provides free clothing to anyone in need that has obtained a voucher from one of the local non-profit agencies. People often access these non-profit agencies first any way so this has offered a smooth progression in providing needed services," Leah said.
