In addition, Vlahakis noted that staff served 3,625 civil papers and

conducted 23 foreclosure sales.

The office was responsible for completing 240 inmate transports, serving 906 arrest warrants and issuing 452 concealed weapon permits.

In the jail, 1,954 inmates were held, which was 26 more than 2011. That led to 54,765 meals being served.

The 24/7 sobriety program administered by the sheriff's office experienced an increase in usage during 2012.

Staff conducted 35,772 tests, an increase of more than 2,300 compared to 2011.

Vlahakis said he looks forward to being fully-staffed in 2013.

'We added two deputies a year ago, but they've been getting trained," he stated. "This year, we will be able to have a larger presence overnight."

Currently, the office usually has at least two deputies working until 2 a.m. The additional manpower will enable the sheriff to keep two on duty through the entire night.

services available to them, they are more likely to step forward. I think that is reflected here. I hope in future years, if we are doing a good job of supplying resources to our citizens, those numbers will begin to drop.' When looking at the 2012 activ-

ity of the Yankton Police Department, it had 11,942 calls. That was 265 more than the previous year. Also in 2012, there were:

• 811 adult arrests, compared to 714 in 2011; no murders were reported,

• one robbery, the same as in

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
