Her enthusiasm for club work in "SOROSIS." founded in New York in 1890, later be came GFWC Woman's Club. Our first president was Mrs Swift who organized the club. Programs were consisted of book reviews, lectures, plays and special music programs. The pioneer women raised money to build and estab-

lish the first churches, public school. promoted lectures and concerts in Yankton. They assisted the Red Cross during the two world wars. During World War the women were urged to sell bonds, and from 1941-1944. 110 members raised \$6794, and at the end of the campaign \$294,192 was raised by GFWC Woman's Club by the state of South Dakota to buy a medium bomber and a fighter plane. Through the years the Yankton club supported many projects and donated money to many non profit organizations. In 1985 we adopted the name change to GFWC Yankton Feder ated Woman's Club. Nancy Burgess was the State President of GFWC 1978-1980, she went on to chair GFWC Resolutions Committee. Very interesting.

Joan Neubauer made a motion to approve the minutes of the January meeting, Seconded by Judy Olson. Dot Blaha gave the treasurer's report. We have 62 paid members.
