Woman Accused **Of Neglecting Elderly Mother**

OMAHA, Neb. (AP) — A 53-year-old Omaha woman is charged with neglecting her 80year-old mother after para-medics found the elderly woman in a filthy home with no heat and covered in bedsores and feces. The Omaha World-Herald reports Roslyn Leitz is charged with abuse of a vulnerable adult in the case. If convicted, she could face up to five years in prison.

Prosecutors say Ruth Leitz had a body temperature of 86 degrees when paramedics arrived at the home two weeks ago. Her kidneys were shutting down, and she had been sitting

in the same recliner for weeks. Roslyn Leitz told authorities her mother was stubborn and wouldn't go to the doctor.

Prosecutors say the condi-tion of the house showed that Roslyn Leitz wasn't providing good care.

Western Nebraska Man Dies In **One-Car Accident**

MITCHELL, Neb. (AP) Western Nebraska authorities believe alcohol may have been a factor in a one-vehicle crash that killed a 46-year-old man.

The Scotts Bluff County Sheriff's office says Jose Louis Garcia of Mitchell died in the crash about a mile and a half east of Mitchell Saturday afternoon around 4:30.

Authorities say Garcia was driving east on Spring Creek Road when he lost control of his Chevy Tahoe. Garcia over-cor-rected, veered off the road and struck a utility pole. Garcia died at the scene. He

was not wearing a seatbelt.

Gov. Heineman Asks Lawmakers To Kill His Own Tax Bills

LINCOLN, Neb. — Gov. Dave Heineman on Saturday backed off his proposed overhaul of Nebraska's tax system, saying he would still like to see changes to the tax structure but that he wanted to heed the concerns of businesses, farm groups and others who stood to lose billions of dollars in sales tax exemptions.

Heineman had wanted to eliminate Nebraska's income tax, or at least reduce what retirees pay. In exchange, the Republican governor proposed eliminating as much as \$2.4 billion in sales-tax exemptions for a va-riety of goods and services. Numerous businesses and nonprofit groups would have ended up paying more for seed, farm machinery, lumber and other items used in

their everyday operations. Heineman said he called Sen. Galen Hadley, chairman of the Legislature's Revenue Committee's chairman, and asked lawmakers to kill both proposals that he championed in his State of the State address

Heineman said he decided to withdraw his plans after hearing concerns from lawmakers, farm groups and other Nebraska residents. He said he also wanted to create a "level playing field" for a broader debate on over-arching tax reform.

"I just had a sense from them that maybe the process was moving too quickly," Heine-man said in an interview Saturday. "I think this will make everyone feel a little more comfortable."

Some lawmakers had complained that Heineman announced his plan without holding any discussions with lawmakers or the public beforehand. Heineman has argued that the sales tax exemptions — many of which were approved in 1967 — are outdated and fail to reflect Nebraska's current economy.

Heineman said he now wants a statewide discussion that will include Nebraska's income tax and sales-tax exemptions, as well as possibly lowering sales and property-tax rates.

"I've listened to Nebraskans, and it's now time to move to the next phase of the tax discussion by having the Revenue Committee review and evaluate the various alternatives," he said.

The decision comes nearly one-third of the way into the Legislature's 90-day session. Though Heineman said he hoped the Legislature might still accomplish some kind of tax overhaul before adjourning as scheduled in June, Hadley expressed doubts that lawmakers would finish any major tax proposal this year.

Hadley said Revenue Committee members and other state officials, such as Tax Commissioner Doug Ewald, will likely travel the state this summer to solicit input directly from residents.

The Revenue Committee had been scheduled to vote on both proposals on Wednesday. Hadley said his committee will now kill both proposals.

Sen. Beau McCoy of Omaha, the chief sponsor of both bills, said he expects lawmakers will continue to look at specific sales tax exemptions and business incen-

"This is a huge topic to tackle," McCoy said. "We haven't done this in a very long time. Maybe it can't all be done this session, but you haven't heard anyone say we shouldn't have this conversation.'

Several lawmakers said their focus may now turn to a proposal to create a "Tax Modernization Commission," which would include legislative leaders as well as state tax and budget officials. The bill by Sen. Paul Schumacher of Columbus is set for a hearing Tuesday.
