Packers Increase Tickets For Next Season

GREEN BAY, Wis. (AP) — The Green Bay Packers are increasing ticket prices. Price increases range from \$2 to \$5 depending on the location in Lambeau Field. End-zone seats increase \$2 to \$74. Tickets from the 20-yard line to the end zone increase \$5 to \$85. Seats between the 20-yard lines will go up \$5 to \$97. Prices for the new South End seats are \$82 and \$89. Packers president Mark Murphy says the increases keep ticket prices about average for the NFL. Murphy says the revenue is important to keeping the Packers competitive in the league.

Also, Murphy says the team wants to be fair to visiting teams in terms of shared revenue. One-third of all ticket revenue goes to the visiting team. Invoices are being sent to season-ticket holders this week.

College Men: Nebraska-Omaha Tops Chicago State

OMAHA, Neb. (AP) — Justin Simmons scored 26 points, including three 3-pointers, to help Nebraska-Omaha rally for a 79-75 nonconference victory over Chicago State on Tuesday night. Simmons was 6 of 13 from the floor and 11 of 13 from the line for the Mavericks (10-18), who got 15 points from CJ Carter and 14 from Caleb Steffenmeier. Quinton Pippen led the Cougars (8-18) with 17 points. Nate Duhon and Matt Ross had 15 apiece. Chicago State led for most of the second half and went ahead 62-55 on Pippen's layup with 5:13 to play. But Nebraska-Omaha came alive after that, reeling off a 14-0 run, capped by Simmons' 3-pointer, for a 69-62 lead with 1:53 left. The Mavericks added 10 free throws in the final 1:30 to secure the win.

Senior Kellen Soulek (five points), who sat the final 4:31 of the first half with two fouls, started it off with a bucket in the post while Olson's 3-point play gave the Bucks their first lead since the opening quarter.

Mitchell (5-15) regained a 33-30 lead on Beau Brown layup before the Bucks used a 9-2 run to go up 39-35 on senior Andrew Hummel's layup with 7:42 remaining. The Knicks were within 41-40 and 44-42 with 4:27 to play before Yankton scored the game's final six points to get the win.

It was Yankton's tough defense and winning the battle of the boards that helped the Bucks complete the season sweep of their ESD foe after beating the Knicks 60-46 on Jan. 12. Yankton outbounded Mitchell 33-20, including

an 11-1 advantage in offensive boards that helped the Bucks finish with an 8-0 advantage in second chance points.

Yankton increased its intensity with its man-to-man defense in the second half to limit Mitchell to 33.3 percent (7-of-21) in the final two quarters, most of its 11 turnovers and 17 points after half time. That came after the Knicks made 47.6 percent (10-of-21) in the first half.

"Their defense took us out of a lot of things we wanted to do," Young said. "You've got to give those guys credit. We had a couple key turnovers in the fourth quarter that hurt, but you have to give credit to coach Haynes and their kids."

Yankton won each of the sub-varsity games. Austin Johnson, Reid Sawatzke and Chipper Granflaten each scored eight points to lead the Bucks to a 43-36 victory in the junior varsity contest. Yankton also got seven points from Tanner Termansen and Lane Sawatzke, who grabbed a game-high 13 rebounds.

The Bucks used a second-half surge to take the sophomore game 57-42. Yankton trailed 21-14 at half-time before the Bucks outscored Mitchell 43-21 in the second half, including 20-6 in the third period to take a 34-27 advantage into the fourth quarter. Austin Johnson scored 19 points to pace Yankton while Tanner Frick had 16 and Matt Fitzgerald added 12.

Yankton took the freshman A game 61-47 to finish the season 10-8. Blake Savey scored 15 points, dished out 10 assists and grabbed six rebounds while Syd Boots had 12 points. Alex Withrow had eight points and seven rebounds.
