Feb. 25 to March 2, 2013, is SDSaves week. During this week, sponsors aim to promote good savings behavior, help consumers learn more about personal finance issues and suggest ways to save.

SDSU Extension is part of a national coalition spearheading the promotion of savings across our nation. America Saves is a nationwide campaign run by the Consumer Federation of America that encourages savings among low to moderate income households. Each year they motivate youth and adults to join as a Young America Saver on-line and to take action during this week by opening or adding to an account at a local financial institution. This opportunity allows people to commit to a savings goal and identify specific plans to achieve.

You can enroll as a South Dakota Saver at www.southdakotasaves.org. Enrolled savers receive a newsletter with a variety of savings topics. The website has many online resources where you can learn to save such as building an emergency fund, saving for a home, education or retirement.

The campaign encourages people to set a savings goal; make a plan on how you will save money; and learn to save monthly through direct deposit or automatic transfer from your checking to savings for every time you get paid. Maintaining an emergency savings account should be a top priority for every individual and family. It is possible to have an emergency fund for all Americans, no matter what your income is. With an emergency savings account you will not deplete your savings that is set aside for your personal goals.

There are many places to find money to save. Start with loose change that you accumulate. Americans typically save more than \$100 in loose change each year. Cut back on small, unnecessary expenditures. The America Saves website lists more than twenty ideas for reducing spending. These ideas range from packing a lunch, to switching from daily lattes to daily coffee, to not bouncing checks.

BROOKINGS — This spring SDSU Extension is offering a new format for Master Gardening training by combining eight weeks of online training and three day-long sessions of hands on-training. Online sessions start April 1 and are accessible anywhere there is Internet access and whenever is convenient for participants during the eight weeks.

The three, day-long, handson sessions give trainees the opportunity to learn skills plant and insect identification

by seeing and doing. Participants will be able to choose from five locations for their hands-on training: Mc-Crory Gardens in Brookings or the SDSU Extension Regional Centers in Aberdeen, Pierre, Rapid City and Yankton.

Master Gardeners work in their community to promote and teach gardening. Opportunities include writing articles, giving talks, working at fair booths, helping in community and school gardens, teaching and answering garden questions.

The training gives a wellrounded education preparing them to help their communities.

In 2012 Master Gardeners contributed more than 9,000 hours, worth \$140,400 to our communities.

Training costs also include 50 hours of volunteer payback during the first two years after

# Gov. Daugaard Promotes **Employment Of People With Developmental Disabilities**

PIERRE — Announcing that South Dakota has joined a national network to share resources, South Dakota Gov. Dennis Daugaard has declared an initiative that advocates employment of people with disabilities.

The state Department of Human Services (DHS) recently became a member of the State **Employment Leadership Network** (SELN), connecting South Dakota with developmental disability agencies across the country that are devoted to improving employment outcomes for people with developmental and intellectual disabilities. The DHS Division of Developmental Disabilities will collaborate with other states to share best practices and resources in an effort to develop, implement and support effective employment strategies.

'My administration is committed to advocating the benefits of hiring people with disabilities, and joining SELN is a firm step in that direction," Daugaard said. 'We are willing to learn, ready to contribute and eager to get more people with disabilities em-

ployed."

DHS' membership in SELN coincides with completion of the DHS' new strategic plan <a href="http://dhs.sd.gov/DHS%20Strate">http://dhs.sd.gov/DHS%20Strate</a> gic%20Plan%20(FINAL).pdf>, which reaffirms the department's dedication to developing statewide employment strategies

as well as employment-first policies. Employment first is a movement to guide policy, with a central philosophy that employment is the first priority and preferred outcome for people with

'The timing of our entry into SELN couldn't be better as we move forward with a clear vision of our goals and strategies to optimize the quality of life for people with disabilities," said DHS Secretary Laurie R. Gill. "This initiative recognizes that employment is a significant factor in a person's overall well-being."

Significant research has demonstrated the economic and social value of integrated employment. Full- or part-time employment not only boosts the self-esteem and economic welfare of people with developmental and intellectual disabilities but frequently reduces associated service costs and helps those individuals establish meaningful community connections.

Gill said increasing the number of people with disabilities who are employed in both the private and public sectors has been a longstanding DHS goal, and the governor's support will significantly advance the cause. Gill is hopeful that membership in SELN will improve the department's ability to collect statewide data to annually measure its success in achieving that goal.


