MMC Shines A Theatrical Light With 'Porchlight'

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As a Mount Marty College professor, Terry Lafferty is used to speaking in front of an audience. But she admits it's been quite a different experience making her stage debut — at age 52 — in the MMC production of "Porchlight." This isn't just my first year at MMC, it's also my a first time on

stage — if you don't count seventh grade, when I performed in 'Stations of the Cross' but didn't have any lines," she said with a laugh. The MMC production runs Feb. 28 and March 1-2 in Marian Audito-

rium on the Yankton campus. Performances begin at 7:30 p.m., and tickets are now on sale. Lafferty received encouragement to try out for a Mount Marty pro-

duction when she arrived on campus last fall. 'We have lunch quite frequently as faculty, and (theater professor) Steve English said I should audition for the spring play," she said. "I was brand new to everything. I didn't even know how to audition, but I went ahead and read for the part."

Lafferty soon caught the acting bug. She was particularly attracted to Mama, the matriarch of the family in "Porchlight."

"When I read the part of Mama, in my head, I could just see me playing this part," she said. "I even thought of Mama in the show Mama's Family, but I haven't based my character on that role (played by Vicki Lawrence).

Lafferty finds herself acting alongside students from her classes. 'The students see me in the classroom or elsewhere on campus, and they address me as 'Dr. Lafferty.' But here on stage, I'm 'Mama' and the leader of the family," she said. "It's interesting to see the interaction (between the students and me). I'm able to do things I don't normally do in the classroom.

Lafferty fits the role well but also brings a new dimension to an otherwise all-student cast, said director Andy Henrickson.

"I'm thankful Terry showed up. She gives us a different perspective," he said. "She has the maturity, and it gives the cast a nice variety. She has embraced it from the get-go."

Those qualities are needed for a strong female lead, Henrickson

"As for Mama, this is her place. She is the foundation and the rock of the family," the director said. "As far as the cast members, Terry is a new performer, but the students respect her as a professor."

FAMILY CONFLICT

In "Porchlight," written by Jeff Richards, the past collides with the present when four generations of the Sparks family meet at the site of the 20-year-old family secret.

The play, set in 1992, takes its name from its setting on the front porch of a run-down shack overlooking a dried-out river bed in Geor-

gia, Henrickson said.

"This family isn't well off. The characters in the play are from a lower socio-economic status," he said. "This is a dysfunctional family, with a tragic secret that took place 20 years previously.

The play contains elements of both a comedy and drama, beginning with a light atmosphere that turns into a serious situation, Henrickson said. The action takes place within a 24-hour time period, from 4 a.m. one day to 4 a.m. the next day.

"Mama has arranged for her daughter, granddaughter and greatgranddaughter to come to the shack," the director said. "The cast knows something awful has happened at this place. That's why Mama is calling people together — but why she's calling them together at this time isn't resolved at the end of the play.' Everyone knows the family secret except the 11-year-old great-

granddaughter, who also has never met Mama, Henrickson said. Throughout the play, the family members reveal the tensions among

Another story line develops for the great-granddaughter, who finally meets her father, Henrickson said.

"The 'baby daddy' isn't a part of the girl's life at all, but he shows up that day to see her," the director said. "It's interesting to see how he lives up to what happened years ago."

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Although Tara Gill has an extensive background directing plays in Yankton, "Aladdin And His Wonderful, Magical Lamp" will be her first time heading a show for the Yankton Children's

"Aladdin is a boy who gets into a lot of mischief," Gill said. "He's always looking for an adventure, and because of that, it leads him to get into trouble."

Eventually Aladdin comes across Jamaal, who is an evil magician in search of a genie lamp. Through all of Aladdin's adventures, he meets Princess Jasmine, who is supposed to get married soon. By the end of the play, he ends up with Jasmine.

"It's just a cute musical, with a lot of new music," Gill said. "The play doesn't have the same songs as the Disney version, and the characters have different names. Although the story is similar, this is a different perspective on it.

She added that the characters in the play are fun, and each have their own, individual personali-

The production will be held on Thursday, Friday, Saturday, Sunday the weekends of Feb. 28 and March 7. Sunday shows are at 2 p.m., all others are at 7:30 p.m. at the Dakota Theatre.

"The kids we have in this play have worked so hard and it's truly an all-kids production," Gill said. "We have a lot of talented kids in this town and the play incorporates dancing and acting. We need a good audience to keep them motivated and keep them in theater. Coming out to the show is a good way to support YCTC and everyone involved with the


Howe Exhibit Showing At USD

A tradition in his culture and his heritage, the Sioux admiration for animals such as buffalo, elk and deer is apparent in Howe's paintings as the artist depicted animals as integral symbols in a variety of Sioux dances and ceremonies.
