MMC Offers Free Tax Preparation

For the 20th year, Mount Marty College students will assist members of the community with preparing their individual tax returns without charge.

Students enrolled in the tax clinic course will help prepare required federal and state tax returns for low-income clients. The students will meet with each client for an initial interview then prepare the necessary tax returns. A second, short appointment will be conducted with each client to go over the results of the tax returns before filing. If a client is determined to require more advanced tax services, they will be asked to seek a professional tax preparer.

Each tax return will go through a verification process to ensure accuracy before being returned to the client for filing. At the conclusion of the tax return preparation process, the client will be given a paper return to mail to the Internal Revenue Service along with a full and complete copy for their personal records.

No data relative to any tax returns will be maintained by Mount Marty College or the students providing this serv-

said. "This will complement the South Dakota Kayak Challenge that runs from Yankton to Ponca

Bies has proposed turning "Fort To Field" into a fundraiser benefiting the river. The race's sponsors could write their checks to the Izaak Walton League of America (IWLA), making the funds tax-deductible.

We would like to plan it with Izaak Walton and make this a win-win situation," Bies said. 'After we cover the expenses of the race, we can use the funds for river awareness and cleanup events similar to (the ones at

Yankton).' IWLÁ spokesman Paul Lepisto said his organization would provide a 501(c)3 outlet for taxdeductible contributions. The "Fort To Field" funds could be kept in a separate account, then disbursed as needed.

With the first kayak race set for July, the Missouri River Stewardship Events wouldn't see any of those funds in time for this May's events, Lepisto said. However, the Yankton events could seek to tap into the funds for 2015 events, he said.

Bies said he has received tremendous support in launching the "Fort to Field" kayaking race. Plans call for the race to run from 7 a.m. to 10 p.m., with checkpoints at Sunshine Bottom; Verdel, Neb.; and Running

'Our goal for the first year is to have 75 to 100 racers," he said, noting the event has al-

ready drawn 100 "likes" on its Facebook page.

The South Dakota Kayak Challenge and the Riverboat Days kayaking event at Yankton have enjoyed success during their run, Bies said. He sees no reason for "Fort To Field" to be any different.

"The (kayaking) audience is there. It just a matter of providing them a show," he said.

"Fort To Field" will feature a safety and education session at Randall Creek Rec Area, near the starting line, Bies said. A number of federal, state, local and tribal officials are on board with the event, marking the newest race on America's newest national water trail.

The Bon Homme Bass League has offered its assistance in maintaining safety for the kayakers and others, Bies

The proposal drew praise from those in attendance at Monday's meeting, who agreed to proceed with the partner-

ship.
MNRR Superintendent Rick Clark said the kayaking race and three Yankton events are positive actions promoting the entire stretch of river.

In turn, the activities send a much broader message, Clark said. "This isn't just about recreation. It's also about conservation and being stewards of the (Missouri River) corridor."

Lepisto sees the opportunities for more outreach activities. "There has been talk of a cleanup for the 39-mile stretch, and this (kayak challenge) could be a springboard to do something on that reach," he said.

MNRR clean-ups are currently held at Yankton, Vermillion and Ponca, Neb. Last fall's inaugural clean-up at Verdel, Neb., was canceled because of inclement weather and the federal government shutdown.

Yankton city employee Marv Robb, who directs the school festival, welcomed the financial support from the kayaking race. In addition, she sees all river activities promoting each other and drawing more attention to the entire stretch.

'We could hold hands and help each other," she said. "The 'Fort To Field' could put in a plug for the river clean-up and the expo. And we give away promotional information (at the school festival), if (kayak organizers) have information to give

The school festival has registered 245 students — the event is capped at 500 — with a month remaining before the registration deadline, Robb said.

The festival will feature 16 presentations on a variety of topics, Robb said. A number of those presenters will return the following day for the river expo.

The river clean-up, which draws about 200 volunteers annually, will again collect trash and debris from below Gavins Point Dam, said Kevin Kuhl, the Yankton city engineer and public services director.

Kuhl is also working with the expo through the Lewis and Clark Trails District of the Sioux Council of the Boy Scouts of

The day will also promote the water trail and even bird-

watching, Kuhl said. The possible addition of a birdwatching session earlier in the morning would offer some great possibilities, said committee member Gene Bormann.

"When we had the Ross's

gull here (in November/Decem-

ber 2010), it was a very big deal," he said, noting the influx of birdwatching enthusiasts from across the nation. The final activity, the Clean Boat Event, seeks to create awareness among boaters on

ways to keep invasive species from advancing above Gavins Point Dam. The National Park Service finds the effort particularly timely as the agency nears its centennial, Clark said. The milestone present a prime opportu-
