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Mercy Rule Keeping Games From Getting Out Of Hand

Just because the Crofton girls basketball team drills you like a dentist facing a mouthful of cavities, that doesn't mean the Warriors don't have a little compassion in doing it.

Thanks to the new mercy rule instituted by the Nebraska School of Activities Association, the Warriors have no choice in letting up on the gas sometimes.

The rule, in general, states that when a team leads by 40 points in the second half, the rule takes affect. That means the clock continues to run unless a team calls a time out or a player is injured.

Even if a team cuts into the 40point lead, the rule stays in affect. Crofton head coach Aaron Losing said the National Federation of High School Sports has encouraged states

'I think it's a good rule," said Losing. "When a team gets down by that far, it really does help to control the game and things don't get completely out of hand."

The rule helps avoid scores of 120-4 and wipeouts like that.

Crofton, out to a zinging 16-1 start heading into the Mid-State Conference basketball tournament this week, has had a few lopsided scores to deal with this year.

The Warriors have pummeled Creighton (73-37), O'Neill (79-15), Battle Creek (67-25), Atkinson West Holt (63-17) and Lutheran High Northeast

Crofton won at Vermillion, S.D., 83-37 but South Dakota does not have the mercy rule.

"The rule has been good for us," said Losing. "It's forced us to get our younger players in the game a lot sooner. The kids on our bench have gotten more playing time because of

Of course, one drawback to the rule is that the starters get pulled a lot earlier and may not get as much playing time as in the past.

That worries coaches on how their team react in a competitive contest where they may have to play the entire game.

The Warriors, the Class C2 returning state champions, are competing in the Mid-State Conference for the second year in a row. They opened the tournament with a win over Battle Creek and will face Pierce, the defend-

ing C1 state champs in the semifinals. Pierce and Crofton hooked up in a regular season match-up last ThursMost expected a barn-burner of a

game but the Warriors shell-shocked the Bluejays 70-39.

"Pierce is a really good team," said Losing. "We just played extremely well that night."

Allison Arens singed the nets for 24 points and drained 8 of the Warriors 13, 3-point baskets.

'We've been shooting the ball extremely well the last month and a half," said Losing. "We also were able to do some things with our defense and create some turnovers. We also rebounded the ball well.'

Losing said the Warriors have tweaked their offense and defense this year to help play to the team's strengths.

"It forces us to use our depth and our speed more," said Losing. "We like to create turnovers and we're

probably shooting the ball a lot more from the outside this year. We haven't had a lot of 3-point shooters in the past, but we've shot a lot more of them this year, that's for sure.'

Crofton could have the opportunity to avenge its only loss this season should it meet Guardian Angels Central Catholic of West Point in the

Mid-State finals. The Bluejays beat Crofton 59-53 back on Dec.14 in West Point.

'We play in a conference were you have to be ready to go every night or you could lose," said Losing. "Our goal is to make it to the championship round and hope for the best.'

Possibly after Monday's game with Battle Creek the Warriors won't have to bother with the new mercy rule But Crofton wouldn't mind using it if

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A common phrase in the world of college athletics recruiting is 'keep them in state.' In other words, if at all possible, keep talented players within the borders. South

found ways to combat issues associated with scholarships, walk-on offers and the allure of other regional pro-

The Coyotes, for one, have used the pride factor.

'You see a lot of tough kids that want to play for their home state," said head coach Joe Glenn, whose program will unveil its 2014 recruiting class on Wednesday as part of National Signing

"I know, when I was here, that was really important to those guys; made them play even harder, like they had something to prove.

For Shav Bratland, one of those in-state players who will sign with USD on Wednesday, location didn't necessarily matter at first. Eventually, though, the running back from Watertown, understand the in-state theme.

"Honestly, when I first started getting recruited, I didn't have a sense of where I wanted to go, it was just whatever place fit me the best," Bratland said. "It was pretty broad.

"But once I made a decision, I realized it was pretty big to stay close.

And judging by the proiected recruits for both USD and SDSU, there will be another steady stream of South Dakota names mixed in with the traditionally regionalheavy classes.

The unofficial pre-signing day count includes six South Dakota recruits for the Coyotes: Bratland, Nick Jensen (OL, Vermillion), Kray Krolikowski (DE, Winner), Spencer Hopkins (OLB, Sioux Falls O'Gorman), Justin Harkless (QB, Hot Springs) and Chase Glazier (QB, Custer). More could commit before Wednesday.

South Ďakota State will likely have a handful more, including J.J. Hejna of Yankton.

Many athletes like Bratland have other the years cited the D-I level as a major attraction in recruiting, and so, in that way there doesn't need to be much prodding. The only persuasions would come in keeping a certain athlete away from the rival school.

"I would much rather not see them go up to up north,' Vermillion head coach Andy Homan joked, referring to South Dakota State.

"But it's great to see both program keeping athletes from leaving South Dakota," he added. "Both programs have rich traditions that they are either trying to rebuild or keep going.

Developing coaches is key to producing college-ready players at the high school level, Glenn said. He specifically referenced schools that have "full staffs," as well as the number of coaches who attended the South Dakota High School Football Coaches Association clinic.

Another such area that needed attention that Glenn referred to was special teams. USD also nabbed a transfer in Eric Shufford, a wide receiver and kick returner from San Bernardino Valley College (Calif.).

Though he was not able to comment on specific recruits until they sign, Glenn said Wednesday's full list should be somewhere between 25-30

'The only thing is, you don't get them all. You're not going to beat everybody,' said Glenn, who referrenced North Dakota State. "At the same time, we cast our net far and wide enough to get some good athletes.'
