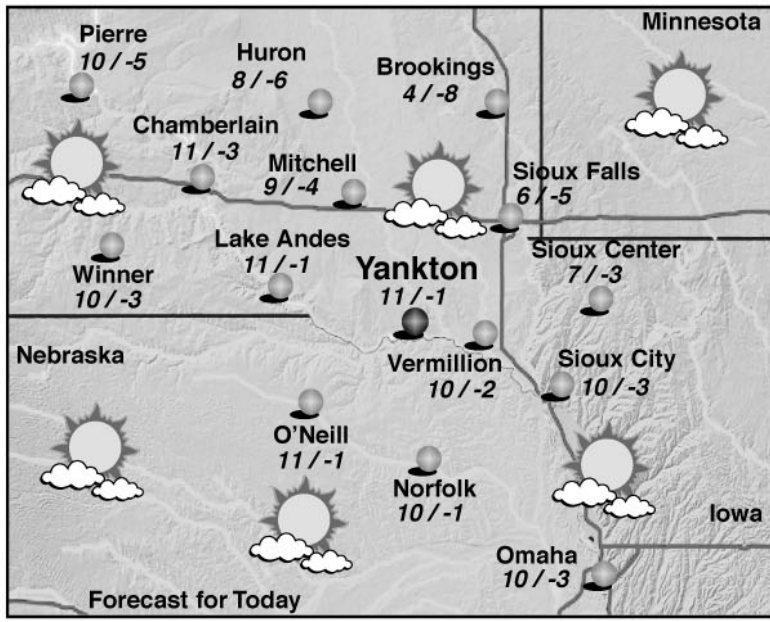

State House Says 'No' To Traffic Cameras

PIERRE — The state House of Representatives voted 69-1 Wednesday to ban the use of traffic cameras for automatic ticketing in South Dakota.

HB 1100 would prohibit use of cameras to record red-light violations and speeding violations.

The proposal's prime sponsor, Rep. Peggy Gibson, D-Huron, listed several incidents where the wrong drivers were cited.

She said automated tickets are civil penalties that have less recourse for motorists who contest them.

"Red light cameras are an invasion of our privacy," she said. "Red light cameras are

primarily a way to raise money and not improve safety."

Rep. Steve Hickey, R-Sioux Falls, said he's changed sides and believes a motorist's rights were violated in a Sioux Falls case.

"People watch the government to keep that in check," he said. "It's not supposed to be the government watching the people and everything we're doing."

Rep. Don Kopp, R-Rapid City, said the cameras don't stop speeding and don't inhibit traffic accidents. "It's just a way of making money," Kopp said.

The one "nay" vote came from Rep. Tona Rozum, R-Mitchell.

The measure now heads to the Senate for a committee hearing.

The U.S. stock market finished slightly lower on Wednesday, adding to its losses so far this year.

A survey on hiring did little to ease uncertainty about the health of the economy.

The Dow teetered between slight gains and losses as the sell-off eased by late afternoon. But the upswing ultimately didn't hold.

CHICAGO (AP) — Grain futures were higher Wednesday on the Chicago Board of Trade.

Wheat for March delivery rose 3 cents to \$5.8750 a bushel; March corn was 1.50 cents higher \$4.4325 a bushel; March oats advanced 18.75 cents to \$4.4325 a bushel; while March soybeans rose 3 cents to \$13.1625 a bushel.

Beef was mixed and pork was higher on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange.

April live cattle was .20 cent higher at \$1.3910 a pound; March feeder cattle was .05 cent lower at \$1.6692 a pound; while April lean hogs rose 1.88 cents to \$9.9500 a pound.
