USD Looks to Build On Summit League Berth

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VERMILLION — An upbrupt end to last season has not only fueled the fire for 2014 for the University of South Dakota softball team, but it has provided the Covotes with a tangible area of

It was nothing between the lines that led to USD's two losses in the Summit League post-season tournament, it was more things between the ears, according to head coach Amy Klyse.

'The stage and the mental game, and the pressure, that's what got to us," said Klyse, who begins her seventh season. "Physically we had the tools to win that tournament.

"But mentally we weren't

And so, that was what the Coyotes (29-20 last year) spent a bulk of their pre-season activities working on.

As part of that preparation, the Coyotes went through what they called "Mental Mondays" with an on-campus specialist — who had the players work on goal setting and visualization tactics. USD also spent time with the campus ROTC program to help increase team chem-

"I think we're at the point where we're ready physically," said senior shortstop

Christine Broders, a Yankton native. "Now it's being mentally prepared for the whole season.

That season begins today (Friday) at the 3-day University of Central Florida Tournament in Orlando.

After advancing to the Summit League tournament last spring in its first year of eligibility, USD returns eight of its nine starters, and 11 of the 12 players who had an atbat in 2013.

Still, even with all that experience back, the Covotes could afford to devote more

time to the mental side of training — rather than having to find replacements for departed players, Klyse said.

"We set up our practice situations for failure, so you have to learn how to deal with it and fight back," she said. "It's more mental than

anything physical."

To ensure that practices have more of a game feel, the Covotes rotated from offense and then back to defense. rather than spending half the time working on one side and the rest on the other.

Picked to finish fourth in the Summit League this season, USD returns nearly its entire offense, including four all-league selections.

Back for the Coyotes are seniors Lindsey Boyd (.296, 48 runs, 35 steals) and

Harrisburg increased their defense's intensity as the second half got underway creating four failed possessions for the Bucks allowing the Tigers to cut away at some of the Buck's 13-point lead.

Trainor and Austin Bicknase had a bucket each in the Tiger's run but the Yankton offense was quick to strike back ending the third period

"They made a run at us in the beginning of the third quarter to cut it to I think seven or eight and then our guys did a good job responding and pushed it right back to double figures and were able to extend the lead in the fourth quarter," Haynes said.

In the fourth period the Tiger's defense was determined not to give up points easily as they allowed only 12 points in the period. Yankton's Hale made a couple of free throws to put the Bucks to their final score 55-33.

Yankton says that they feel ready for there game against Sioux Falls O'Gorman Saturday and will look to tighten up their offensive

FORT WAYNE, Ind. — Senior Hannah Strop and freshman Chynna Stevens each posted career highs as South Dakota State (17-7, 8-0) extended its win streak to eight games with a 77-66 victory over Fort Wayne (11-11, 4-4) in Summit League women's basketball action Thursday in front of 360 fans in Gates Sports Center.

Strop and Stevens each scored 16 points for the Jacks. Strop was 4 of 7 from the field, including 2 of 5 from threepoint range, and a perfect 6 for 6 from the free-throw line. Stevens was 4 of 5 from the field with two treys and was also 6 for 6 from the foul line. The forward also grabbed eight rebounds.

Juniors Mariah Clarin and Megan Waytashek each grabbed a game-high nine rebounds. Junior Gabby Boever had a season- and game-high six steals.

Yankton Baseball Hall Of Fame

Inductees include Bob Tereshinski, Hal Anderson and the 1960 Yankton All-Star team, the first team to attend the national Teener baseball

tournament in Hershey, Pa. Tereshinski played baseball and football at Yankton College, graduating in 1968. He taught and coached in Tabor and Crofton, Neb., before returning to YC as an assistant coach for both baseball and football. He left YC for the business world in 1976, but remained active in baseball as an amateur player.

He coached the Yankton Legion team in the early 1980s, then took over the Mount Marty College program in 1987 and turned the team into the premier college baseball program in South Dakota in the 1990s. Tereshinski, who retired from coaching after the 1999 season, was inducted into the Yankton College Hall of Fame in 2004 and the MMC Athletic Hall of Fame in 2007.

Anderson was a local pitcher who went on to sign with the New York Yankees in the late 1940s. He played on the inaugural Yankton Terry's State League team in 1947 before his stint in the Yankee organization. He was assigned to Grand Forks in the Northern eague, but developed arm troubles and saw his pro career end.

Anderson returned to Yankton as the executive director of Yankton Medical Clinic, and oversaw construction of its current facility in the late 1970s. He passed away in 2001.

The 1960 Yankton team advanced to the Teener World Series, beating a Williston, N.D., team led by former NBA playing and coaching great Phil Jackson, in the district final. Six of the 15 members of that team still live in Yankton. The squad was coached by Don Baker, who went on to coaching success at Southern State College and the University of South Dakota, and included two individuals currently in the South Dakota Sports Hall of Fame, Roger Heirigs and Red Loecker.

The event begins with a social hour at 6 p.m., followed by dinner at 7 p.m. and the induction ceremony at 7:40 p.m.
