The Flying Fish Invasion

As we headed up into the Jim River from the Missouri to do some bowfishing, we had no idea what to expect as there had been rumors that Silver Carp, flying fish were now in the river.

Motoring upstream, we could see a few fish coming out of the water, wow this is something I thought, pretty cool.

Then it happened, all hell broke loose as Silver Carp, all sizes, large and small started going airborne in every direction, bouncing off the front deck of the boat, both sides, off the motor, off my arm and head

and into the boat. Before this day was over, we would end up with eighteen Silver Carp, running from three to seventeen pound flying into the boat

This was late season, when the water was beginning to cool, when a fish's metabolism was slowing

down, what it would be like during the heat of the summer.

Can you imagine someone on a Jet Ski or water skiing trying to dodge dozens and dozens of big fish flying going three feet into the air all around you?

Team Outdoorsmen Adventures member Marlyn Wiebelhaus who guides bow fishermen found out first hand on a trip up the Jim a couple of years back. In order to see what is in front of the boat, he stands while his clients do their best to shoot to these flying fish off the back of the boat.

One large fish came up over the dash, striking him right between the eyes, breaking his sunglasses and knocking him over the seat to the back floor. Luckily, for him, he had

his hand on the throttle and pulled

it back as he went over. You would be surprised how high they can jump when a boat comes near. It is believed the vibration of the motor startles them, feeling endangered, they go airborne to escape and have injured and killed boaters and skiers when hit at high

These fish get big as Marlyn can testify as in 2009; he took the South Dakota Silver Carp unrestricted state record a twenty-two pound ten ounce fish with his bow, which came from the Jim River.

The Nebraska archery sate record Silver Carp weighed thirtyeight pounds 10 ounces.

They are a strange looking fish, having a head with no scales, while their body has very small scales. Their eyes are located towards the front of the head near the bottom. The mouth of the Silver Carp is toothless and turns up; they have a very thick body with flat sides. They are olive-green in color with silver sides and may have a bronze

Just how big can these fish get, would you believe over fifty pounds with reports of some up to one hundred pounds and forty inches long.

What they feed on is zooplankton and phytoplankton, tiny organisms at the bottom of the aquatic food chain and small insects. They are mostly filter feeders but seem to be adapting to eat a more varied

Silver Carp eat enough plankton to damage native fish populations by removing food at the lower end of the food chain, removing food native filter feeders like paddlefish need. They also create problems for native fish, as the fry of other game fish also feed on plankton

They grow quickly, from nine to twelve inches a year; it is believed that Asian carp could be the most abundant large (over five pounds) fish in the lower Missouri River.

Just how did these Asian Carp, the Silver get into our river sys-

They started out down south when aquaculture farmers imported them from Asia in the 1970s to control algae and plankton in their fish farms. By the early 1990s, they were released into the wild or escaped from those fishponds.

It did not take them long to spread into much of the Mississippi

River drainage, including the Missouri, Ohio and Illinois Rivers and their tributaries. Studies on the Illinois River found Silver Carp can cover water quickly, moving forty to fifty miles a day.

They mature and breed in their third year and will continue to breed until they are ten years old.

The only thing that has stopped them from moving up stream are the dams, with states taking precautions to keep these nuisance fish from spreading up stream by implementing rules that don't allow live bait to be brought up stream from the dams.

In South Dakota, Silver Carp have spread in the Missouri River and its tributaries including into the Jim and the Sioux River.

The fish are abundant in the Missouri River of Nebraska and its tributaries, including the Platte, Loup and Elkhorn rivers

In Iowa, they have spread from the Missouri. River into the tributaries such as the Sioux River and have made their way up into the Iowa Great Lakes area of north central Iowa.

As of this writing, there is little or no way to control their spread into other waters. Bow fishermen take a few, as do commercial fishermen, which will not put even a small dent in their quickly growing population.

The only bright side, if there is to this problem is that Silver Carp when cleaned and prepared properly, make excellent eating.
