Nebraska AG Bruning Joins Neb. Gubernatorial Race

LINCOLN, Neb. (AP) — As many anticipated, Attorney General Jon Bruning has declared his candidacy for Nebraska governor.

The Republican joined the crowded GOP primary field Saturday, about three months before the May 13 primary. His decision also opens the race for attor-

ney general. "I've had a front row seat to 15 years of great leadership by (Gov.) Mike Johanns and (Gov.) Dave Heineman," he told the Omaha World-Herald. "I know what it takes.'

Bruning, 44, enters the race with immediate statewide name recognition and \$850,000 in his campaign fund. Bruning, who's been attorney general since 2003 and previously was a state senator, also has twice run unsuccessfully for U.S. Senate, most recently in 2012 in a race won by Republican U.S. Sen. Deb Fischer.

He had said last week that he began

looking at running after undergoing surgery for colon cancer in December and receiving dozens of calls and text-messages from well-wishers who urged him to consider a bid.

My life has taken some turns in the last few months ... When you come through those experience, you realize that you need to not give up and you never stop fighting, and you make the most of your opportunities," he told the Lincoln Journal-Star.

The other Republican candidates are Omaha businessman Pete Ricketts, State Auditor Mike Foley, Omaha tax attorney Bryan Slone and Nebraska state Sens. Tom Carlson and Beau McCoy. Former University of Nebraska Regent Chuck Hassebrook is unopposed in the Democratic primary. Governor Dave Heineman says it's

unusual for someone to join so late and "become the initial front-runner." As for campaigning, Bruning says

he'll start a statewide tour on Monday.

"There's no need for press conferences," he said. "I just need to get out and spend time with the people of this

state as I have always done." Ricketts still leads the GOP field in fundraising, with nearly \$1.4 million in his campaign fund, and could be Bruning's stiffest competition. Plus, there's some history between the men. Late in the 2012 U.S. Senate primary race, a political group founded by Rickett's father paid for a negative ad campaign against Bruning.

Bruning's decision opens the door to a likely flood of candidates in the attorney general race, in which he was running for re-election.

Lincoln attorney Doug Peterson, a Republican, has already thrown his hat in the ring. Other Republican prospects for the job include Lincoln attorney Mike Hilgers, Omaha attorney Brian Buescher and Nebraska state Sen. Pete Pirsch. Pirsch, an Omaha attorney, has announced plans to run for state auditor.

Fremont Police Officers To Face Investigation

City officials have known about the incident involving current and former Fremont police officers since several days after the Dec. 3, 2012, crash that killed 18-year-old Jacob Dickmeyer, Fremont City Attorney Paul Payne told The Omaha World-Herald.

Death Of WSC Player Investigated

WAYNE, Neb. (AP) - Nebraska authorities are investigating the death of an 18-year-old Wayne State College football player who was found dead in his dorm room.

An autopsy was scheduled to be performed Sunday on Eddie Key III's body. He was found in his dorm room around 7 p.m. Saturday.

Authorities believe Key likely died in his sleep Saturday morning, said Amy Miller with the Wayne County Attorney's office. Key was last seen alive around 4 a.m. Saturday.

Wayne State spokesman Jay Collier says the college of about 3,600 students in northeast Nebraska is providing counseling to the football team and other residents of the dormitory where Key lived.

Key played defensive end for Wayne State last fall after he graduated from Lincoln North Star High School in Lincoln, Neb., in 2013. He was a second-team All-Nebraska player and was recognized for his play on the offensive line at North Star as a high school junior and senior.

Key's high school coach, Mark Waller, said the young man had appeared to have a bright future.

"He was just a great kid," Waller said. "It's a tragic situation. We loved Eddie and we're going to miss him.

The Lincoln school district plans to send counselors to North Star to visit with Key's former teammates and classmates.

Officers Shoot At Suspect's Truck

OMAHA, Neb. (AP) - Two Omaha police officers' decision to shoot at a fleeing suspect's truck will be investigated, but no one was seriously injured in the shooting.

Police Officer Michael Pecha says the two officers were working security at the Tquila Bar when the incident happened early Sunday.

The officers and the bar's security staff noticed someone prowling the parking lot checking car doors while another man followed in a white truck.

The man roaming the lot was apprehended without incident, but the man in the truck drove at the officers as he fled. The officers fired at the truck.

The man in the truck turned himself into police later and was arrested.

One of the officers sustained minor injuries. Both officers will be on leave while the shooting is investigated.

Pierre Woman Pleads Guilty In Standoff

PIERRE (AP) — A Pierre woman has pleaded guilty in federal court to making false statements to a federal agency.

Prosecutors say Kelsey Howe lied about knowing the whereabouts of Jason Garreau, who was involved in a shootout near Fort Thompson in October with law enforcement. One person was killed.

KCCR-AM reports Kelsey Howe entered the guilty plea last week. Howe had earlier been indicted on the charge and had initially pleaded innocent, requesting a jury trial. She later agreed to a plea bargain in the case.

Howe faces up to six months in prison. A sentencing date has not been set.

RC Residential Real Estate Strong

RAPID CITY (AP) — Officials say residential real estate sales in the Rapid City area boomed in 2013.

The Black Hills Association of Realtors says more houses were sold at higher prices in 2013 than any of the previous five

The Rapid City Journal reports the average sale price of a residence in the Rapid City area was \$175,087 in 2009. That number peaked at \$199,058 in 2013.

The price of housing has increased by almost \$25,000 since 2009, but demand has climbed alongside price. In 2009, 1,376 residential listings were sold. In 2013, 1,826 listings were sold.

Housing also sold much faster in 2013. It took an average of 66 days to sell a home in 2013 compared to 82 days in 2009.
