MMC Looks To Refocus After Loss To Hastings

As the Mount Marty College men dropped an 85-42 decision to Hastings College Saturday at Laddie E. Cimpl Arena, the typically-firey head coach of MMC sat in stunned silence. After the game, his players did the talking.

Their message was that we have three games left. We need to refocus, understand who we are as players and as a team, and make the most of them," head coach Andrew Baker said of the 20-minute post-game meeting after the loss, MMC's 21st in 25 games this season.

Hastings (19-6), ranked second in the Great Plains Athletic Conference and 15th in the nation, took control of the game early, scoring the game's first 20 points and leading 31-3 before the Lancers got going. That stretch included eight missed shots — five of them layups — and nine turnovers by Mount Marty.

The Lancers scored eight straight points to close to within 20, but Hastings stretched the lead back to 29 by halftime. In the second half, the margin was no less than 27.

Baker admitted that fatigue was a factor for his young team, a senior-less squad that faced a Hastings squad that starts three seniors and two juniors, and brings five more seniors off the bench. MMC only has three players that came into this season with more than 20 varsity experiences.

They have some mental fatigue, especially when we're 4-21," Baker said. "They're not used to playing as many games, and they're not used to losing.'

Senior Ibou Fall posted 19 points and eight rebounds off the bench to lead Hastings. Seniors Jake Hamburger (17 points), Brady Lollman (12 points, 6 assists) and Brett Wells (10 points) were also in double figures.

Tyler Payer led MMC with eight points. Chris Richardson had seven points, five rebounds and three steals.

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Crofton Clips Norfolk Catholic For Mid-State Girls' Title

NORFOLK. Neb. - Aaron Losing's halftime speech didn't rattle the mirrors of the Crofton girls basketball team's locker room.

But it was enough to make the Warriors look at how they were playing in the first half against Norfolk Catholic.

"It was pretty intense," War-rior junior Allison Arens said of Losing's intermission talk. Arens led with 18 points, 13 in the second half.

Crofton slapped on its nearly full court defensive pressure and took the life out of the Knights offense in a 53-43 victory in the Mid-State Conference championship game Saturday night at Northeast Community College's Activities Center.

Crofton, which joined the Mid-State last year, repeated as conference champions.

a 28-23 deficit after the Knights' Jennifer Keenan drained a nearly half-court shot at the buzzer, got into a defensive flow and outscored the Knights 20-6 in the third quarter to lead 43-34.

"Coach (Losing) told us our shots weren't falling the first half and that we needed to execute a little different on offense," said Arens. "We needed more drive and needed to get our transition buckets going. We had to play solid, man-up 'D."

Arens, who had a hard time getting a shot to fall in the first half, scored seven points in the third quarter and Allison Tramp swished in a 3-pointer at the buzzer to give Crofton a ninepoint cushion heading into the fourth.

"That's kind of her speciality," Losing said of Tramp's 3point ability. "That also helped continue our momentum into the fourth guarter."

Crofton's defensive pressure caused nine Norfolk Catholic turnovers in the third and 24 for the game. The Warriors turned the ball over 10 times.

The Warriors (19-1) hit just 3 of 10 free throws in the first half and were 10 of 12 in the second half. Crofton connected on 7 of 14 field goals in the third after going 9 of 29 the first two quarters.

"Norfolk Catholic makes you earn things," said Losing. They're a great coached team and Tim Kassmeier does a great job with them. "Their kids were prepared and the first half showed that. But credit our kids for being more aggressive against them in the second half. And our mindset was a little bit different, offensively. We took the basket to the hole more and didn't settle for outside shots."

Crofton began the fourth quarter with a 12-2 run and led 54-36 after Ouinn Wragge sank 1 of 2 free throws with 5:42 left in the game. Wragge added 14 points for the Warriors who play at Norfolk Catholic on Thursday.

"In the first half we hit a couple of shots and our kids were playing with confidence." said Norfolk Catholic coach Tim Kassmeier. "We had a really good flow to what we were doing. But give Crofton credit, they really picked up the intensity in the second half. We didn't handle their pressure as well as we would have liked to have done. But you have to give credit to a team that takes it to you, too.'

Keenan led the Knights (14-6) with 16 points.

Losing said winning the conference title is special because of the quality of teams in it.

There are five or six teams which have a chance to win make it to state and make a run at the title," said Losing. "I hope we can be one of them.

Fifth-ranked Hastings College spoiled homecoming for the Mount Marty College women's basketball team, downing the Lancers 80-65 in Great Plains Athletic Conference action on Saturday at Laddie E. Cimpl Arena.

Jamie Van Kirk scored 23 points, including 19 in the first half, to lead Hastings (23-3, Ĭ3-3 GPAC). Laurel Zwiener gained 15 points and 12 rebounds, while Frankie Peterson contributed 13 points and 10 rebounds in the effort.

Logan Wagner led Mount Marty with 16 points. Denae Veldkamp scored 12 points and Holly Hegge notched 10 points and seven rebounds in the effort.

Hastings started with a seven-point lead early on in the first half, setting the tone for the rest of the game. The Lancers offense kept the effort to keep their opponent from gaining a larger lead.

"Our offensive played really well, and we had a lot of flow today," said Lancer guard Cassidy Gebhart.

Hastings kept ahead of the Lancers throughout the first half by playing from the outside, with the Broncos' Van Kirk gaining two three-point shots. Towards the end of the first half, the Mount Marty powered through to close the gap between the scores with one-point difference behind Hastings 31-30.

"We wished we could have gotten a better start," said MMC head coach Tom Schlimgen. "We had a lot of really good shots early, but we got behind 10 points in the first six minutes.

Schlimgen, though, was still pleased with how the team played.

'We're proud of how hard they played," he said. "Our effort was really good, but we played a really great basketball team with a really great season. We did a lot of things we prepared for really well. We tried to do what we could do and it wasn't good enough. I'm not happy with how the game turned out, but I'm pleased with how the players did. It's never easy to not get a victory.'

Gebhart noted that Saturday's effort was an improvement from the first meeting between the teams, a 93-77 Hastings victory just before Christmas.

"We did better on guarding and drive and guarding their post players," she said.

However, Hastings pulled ahead with a three-point shot by Autumn Zenon, along with a two-point free throw and a twopointer netted by Van Kirk. The Broncos' final drive left the halftime score at 37-30.

After a close first half for the teams, the Mount Marty's defense wasn't enough to keep Hastings at bay for long. Hastings pulled ahead from the Lancers, managing to gain over a 10-point lead for the rest of the second half.

The Mount Marty women head to Sioux City, Iowa, on Wednesday night to play Briar Cliff (14-12, 7-9 GPAC). Gebhart is confident the team will do well.

"We'll be ready for the next game, espe-

cially with a lot of hurt players coming back," she said.

The Lancers have been experiencing a surprising number of injuries this season, including leading scorer Raquel Sutera, who was unable to play on Saturday. However, head coach Schlimgen is hopeful that the team will be "healthier" for the game on Wednesday.

'Our kids are playing a lot of minutes, but the efforts still there," he said. "We're not the only team out their doing that. We have to do with what we've got.

Schlimgen also hopes to gain a few victories in the team's final three games.

'We're trying to get some wins before the season comes to a screeching halt. We're confident we can do that.'
