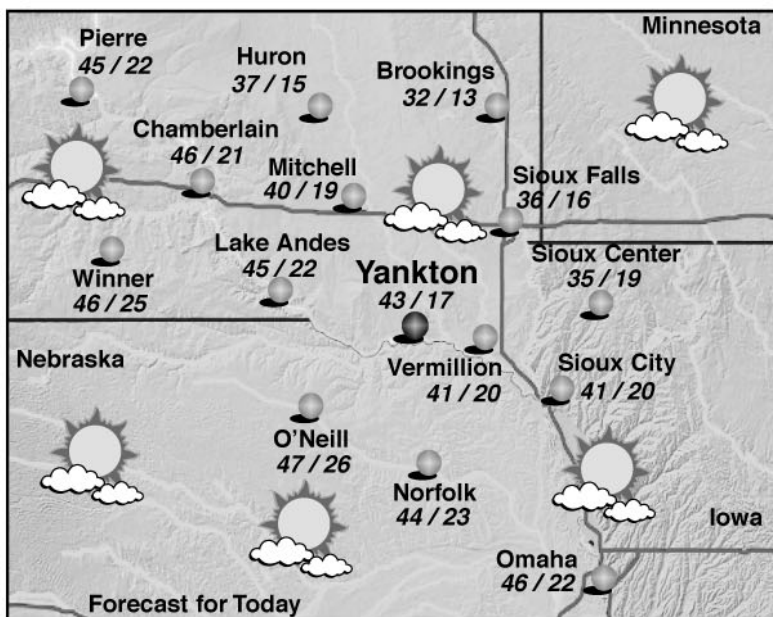

The Dow Jones industrial average logged its best week of the year on Friday. Stocks rose as investors focused on company earnings and shrugged off a weak report on industrial production for January, attributing the slump to unusually cold winter. Cliffs Natural Resources and Campbell Soup were among the companies that rose after reporting earnings.

In addition to providing education about local law enforcement, Paulsen said he hopes that word-of-mouth spread by the participants can diminish some of the inaccurate perceptions the public has about the department.

"Eventually we'll have a number of folks who have gone through it, and they can say, 'No, I went through the Citizen's Academy, and this was explained as to why they do that,'" he said. "It should really take away from a lot of the misunderstandings about why we do what we do."

Participation in the academy is currently by invitation only, Paulsen said, as the department has mostly focused on involving local businesses, religious groups and commissions. However, upcoming academies likely will be open to applications from the public, he said.

Future programs could also expand to include other law enforcement agencies, such as the South Dakota Highway Patrol or the South Dakota Game, Fish & Parks. "There's much more involved in the law

enforcement in our community than just the police department and the sheriff," Paulsen said.

But for now, the police chief said he is excited to get this year's program under way. "It's a good time," he said. "The officers get a lot of feedback and input from the folks who are in the class. And they get very good questions — folks are very interested in what we're doing."
