## Public Libraries Receive Accreditation

PIERRE — Eleven South Dakota public libraries were accredited by the South Dakota State Library in 2013, under a tiered accreditation system.

The libraries were honored at a recent ceremony before lawmakers, colleagues and patrons at Rawlins Municipal Library in Pierre.

The following area libraries were accredited:

- Edith B. Siegrist Vermillion Public Library — Exemplary
- Freeman Public Library — Enhanced
- Platte Public Library — Essential

Public libraries are accredited at one of three levels: Essential, Enhanced or Exemplary. Accreditation at the Essential level means a library satisfactorily provides the basic services required by state law and federal guidelines. Subsequent levels of accreditation build on previous levels. Exemplary status recognizes the highest level of service. Accreditation is valid for three years.

Libraries are evaluated in the following areas, as outlined in South Dakota Public Library standards: governance, administration, access, collections and resources, funding, staffing, technology and public relations.

## South Dakota's Junior Duck Stamp Contest Is Under Way

**SPEARFISH** — Ducks, crayons, paintings, prizes, fun and more ducks. What does that mean? It's time for the annual Junior Duck Stamp Program.

The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service at D.C. Booth Historic National Fish Hatchery invites students to learn about wildlife conservation and express their creativity by entering the 2014 Junior Duck Stamp competition. The deadline for entries is March 15, 2014.

The Junior Duck Stamp Program is an annual free art contest that provides students with the opportunity to learn about biology and express their knowledge of the beauty and diversity of wildlife through art. The Junior Duck Stamp Contest, partnered with a dynamic art curriculum, teaches wetlands and waterfowl conservation to students kindergarten through high school.

Since the Junior Duck Stamp Contest was introduced in South Dakota in 1993, more than 10,000 students have submitted artwork in the state. In 2013, more than 800 South Dakota students from 50 towns participated in the program; and throughout the United States, more than 27,000 students submitted artwork to a state contest. Annual revenue from the sales of Junior Duck Stamps raises an estimated \$200,000 annually to fund scholarships, support

the contest and create environmental education opportunities for students who participate in the program.

Prizes are awarded to the top nine entries in four different age groups at a public awards reception held in April. Last year more than \$4,000 in prizes like art supplies, field guides, DVDs, and binoculars were awarded to South Dakota students. The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service and the Booth Society, the Friends Group of the D.C. Booth Historic National Fish Hatchery & Archives in Spearfish, sponsor the South Dakota contest.

The Best of Show winner from South Dakota is judged nationally in Washington D.C., and the winning submission from the national contest will be used to create a Federal Junior Duck Stamp the following year, which is sold for \$5 a stamp.

In 2013, Madison Grimm of Burbank took the "Best of Show" title in South Dakota, as well as the national title — her painting is on the official 2013 Federal Junior Duck stamp.

The South Dakota Junior Duck Stamp Contest is free and open to all students K-12. The deadline for submissions to be postmarked is March 15, 2014. For more information and art submission rules, visit <http://www.sdjuniorduck.org/>.
