

cording to Carla Becker, the Hartington economic development coordinator.

"There have been large projects happening around the county, and that means jobs and growth for the county and region," she said.

Hartington's downtown revitalization project includes new infrastructure, streets, sidewalks and historical lighting, Becker said. The Westfield Acres housing development remains ahead of projections with the construction of 12 homes during the last two to three years.

Both the Hartington Public and Cedar Catholic school systems have completed renovations, and the Cobblestone Inn and Suites hotel opened last August. In addition, a new fire hall will be

built this spring. Several Hartington businesses have also undergone expansions, Becker said. Hartelco Telecommunications now offers fiber optics within a 10-mile radius, which should further fuel business expansions, she added.

Cedar County growth isn't limited to Hartington, Becker said. She cited larger projects such as the new Agrex site in Laurel, the new grain terminal by Randolph and the new Nissen Winery and Outlaw Trail Center located in northern Cedar County.

NerdWallet also pointed to Cedar County's entrepreneurial program offered through the University of Nebraska-Lincoln.

Cedar County Extension office manager Mary Lou Steffen noted one project encourages young entrepreneurs. Participants create an idea and carry through with production, marketing and sales before making a final presen-

Another program encourages and connects local entrepreneurs of all ages, Steffen said. A daylong program in Hartington featured Cedar County entrepreneurs, with local high school students as special guests.

"The (daylong) program was more of an economic development type of thing where Carla Becker was involved with it," she said. "It went over well and more than

met their expectations." In neighboring Knox County, the NerdWallet ranking was also greeted as great

news. "It's a victory (to have such publicity) when you're trying to promote a positive message that Knox County is a good place to work and live," said Matt Cerny, the county economic development director.

Knox County has built a diversified economic base, Cerny said. The county's biggest assets are its agriculture — both farmland and agribusiness — and its tourism, particularly its Missouri River development and the Ohiya Casino, he said.

"We recently applied for grants to do a county-wide tourism study," he said. 'We're looking at starting a county tourism website.

Wind energy has exerted an economic impact in Knox County, with Crofton and Bloomfield wind farms creating jobs and an increased tax base, he said.

The county has developed a revolving loan fund to provide gap financing for small businesses, Cerny said.

In addition, Knox County also enjoys good medical facilities, Cerny said. He cited Avera Creighton Hospital, the Alpine Retirement Village in Verdigre and a variety of health care providers around the county.

Last summer, Knox County conducted a countywide housing study. The study identified a need for rental housing and affordable starter and medium-range homes. In addition, Creighton has established a tax-increment financing (TIF) district to build senior housing of about a dozen units.

On another front, Cerny is working with an alumni recruitment program.

'I am also working with communities trying to form investment clubs that would purchase existing businesses ... that are for sale but would also look at the possibility of buying outside businesses and relocating them to Knox

County," he said. Knox County benefits from its location near Yankton, whose jobs help maintain a stable population for surrounding communities, Cerny said.

The current influx of jobs into northeast Nebraska is hopefully creating a long-term

ripple effect, Becker said. These 'new' developments bring people into the community not only to do the contract work, but they also draw in new and expanding businesses, visitors, families, and retirees to our commu-

nity," she said. "People are looking for good jobs in communities that offer a great quality of life. With all these developments going on in the community and in the county, we're looking to provide that quality of life.

Rural areas need to create their own destiny, Becker said.

"Helping our businesses grow, bringing in new businesses, providing a stable and growing economic base, and providing good schools and recreational opportunities is all part of the process of growing a successful future for our communities and counties," she said.

At a time when many rural areas are struggling, Cerny hopes the NerdWallet ranking will provide valuable momentum.

"It means we're heading in the right direction," he said. "Something is working for




