Online Registration For Advanced Placement Courses To Begin Soon

Learning Power, South Dakota's program that offers high school students Advanced Placement (AP) coursework online at no cost, will begin registering students for the 2014-15 school year March 10.

The program was developed six years ago especially for students in the state's small schools. Enrollment in those schools often cannot support advanced courses in specialized fields. Learning Power strives to make certain that students in rural schools can apply to college and universities with credits equal to their peers in bigger districts.

All courses are taught online by South Dakota teachers who hold certification granted by the South Dakota Department of Education. Most teachers also currently work in public schools.

'Over the years I have seen Learning Power students realize they have true academic talents," said Mary Cundy, E-Learning and Learning Power principal at Northern State University. She added that the program has created learning opportunities no one even dared dream about a generation ago.

Cundy, who teaches AP Calculus through Learning Power, noted the program can jump-start a student's university experience. "Students

who enter college having already earned university credits via AP exam validation are not only better prepared for university studies, they are more likely to graduate on schedule," she said.

Many colleges and universities grant their own credit to students who score well enough on AP exams. Of course, university credits earned free in high school save families money when tuition bills come due.

A student who passes a course, but without scores high enough to earn university credit, is typically in an excellent position to succeed in and pass that course in college, noted Learning Power coordinator MaryLou McGirr. Students gain "both confidence and the ability to be efficient in their college coursework,' she said.

As for high school academic credit, it is not granted by Learning Power. Rather, the credit comes from the student's home school district. The district assigns a mentor (usually a teacher, counselor or principal) who ensures the student is on track, and who communicates with the online teacher when necessary. The program is funded through the state Department of Education. There is no cost to the student and

the only costs to the school district are course supplies.

Advanced Placement courses in 2014-15 will be Biology, Calculus, Chemistry, English Language and Composition, English Literature and Composition, Physics, and Statistics.

Five years after Learning

Power was established, a statistical comparison found Learning Power students scored at least as well as South Dakota's face-to-face AF students on College Board exams. Nearly 100 percent of Learning Power graduates went on to universities or colleges, 70 percent of them in South Dakota. During the initial five-year period Learning Power enrollment grew from 125 to 338, and in 2013-14, it topped 400. Currently 73 school districts are

participating. Learning Power is a project of the South Dakota Department of Education's Virtual School, Northern State University's E-Learning Center, and Technology and Innovation in Education (TIE).
