Dear Car Talk: I want a VW Tiguan, but VW does not offer one with the TDI diesel engine in the U.S.; it offers other cars with that engine, like the Jetta and the Beetle. If I bought a gasoline-powered Tiguan, what would it take to swap a TDI diesel engine into it?

About \$15,000-\$20,000. Maybe a little less if you're willing to marry a VW me-

The diesel engine itself probably is a \$10,000 part. But there are all kinds of modifications you'd probably need. The exhaust system would be different, and would require a scrubbing system. The emissions system would be different. The computer would be different. The transmission may even be different. I think you probably can keep the rearview mirror and the cup holders.

It might be easier to buy a TDI Jetta and then

put a Tiguan BODY on top of it, Robert! Or get transferred to Europe for a few years and drive one there and get it out of your sys-

It's an enormous and pretty much pointless endeavor, Robert. It would take you half a century to recoup the costs in the form of the extra mileage you'd get with a diesel. And by then you'll be wanting one of the new, 2065 water-powered Tiguans anyway.

Democrats Criticize Measure To Repeal 'Daschle Law'

PIERRE — Democrats are losing a fight against Republican efforts to change the state's so-called "Daschle law" that bars a presidential candidate from seeking another office on the same South Dakota ballot.

The House State Affairs Committee on Friday voted 9-2 for a proposal that would strip away the prohibition, and Democrats say it's fitting to name the modern-day repeal after Republican U.S. Sen. John Thune.

Thune, whose name intermittently appears on lists of potential 2016 presidential candidates, has tamped down expectations that he's running — but he's repeatedly said he's leaving his options open.

The original GOP-backed measure that passed in 2002 faced criticism from Democrats for targeting then-U.S. Senate Majority Leader Tom Daschle, who was considered a possible Democratic presidential candidate in 2004. When Rep. Matt McCaulley defended his measure in 2002, he denied he was targeting Daschle - and he invoked a familiar name.

"I know the link (to Daschle) is inescapable, but it could apply to others in similar positions," McCaulley said at the time. "Congressman (John) Thune is also sometimes talked about as a future presidential possibility."

Flash forward more than a decade, and Democrats watching Republican attempts to scrub the law argue there's a double standard.

"It's just chock full of hypocrisy," said Steve Jarding, a former South Dakota Democratic Party leader and a Daschle ally. "Now that they control all the offices, they change it so that maybe John Thune could run for president and Senate at the same time.'

Thune's office declined to

comment. The arrogance of a party whose electoral success makes them fear nothing has brought South Dakota to this point, said Jarding, who is also a longtime national Democratic strategist.

House Majority Leader Brian Gosch said the 2002 law is "bad policy." Speaking about his proposal, Gosch said South Dakota shouldn't hamstring its already limited political influence. If a South Dakotan such as U.S. Rep. Kristi Noem has the opportunity to give the state a greater voice in the federal government, the law shouldn't stand in the way, he

"(Thune's) chance of being president or vice president, I think is really small and actually unlikely." Gosch said. "This isn't designed (for) him so much as what might happen down the road.

L&C Water Pipeline Picks Up A Funding

TEA (AP) — A pipeline that will deliver Missouri River water to towns and rural water systems in South Dakota, Iowa and Minnesota has picked up more funding from

Washington. The Lewis and Clark Regional Water System will receive an extra \$6.6 million from Bureau of Reclamation, in addition to the original \$2.4 million budgeted for this year.

Executive director Troy Larson says that \$9 million will help the project award another contract.

He says senators and representatives from the three

states helped secure the extra funding. Larson says the water system is 65 percent done and is delivering water to 11 of its 20 members.

Derailed Train Cars Cause 350-Ton Spill

NEBRASKA CITY, Neb. (AP) — Three derailed train cars caused a 350-ton coal spill and halted traffic at three intersections in eastern Nebraska.

Omaha Public Power District spokesman Mike Jones says no one was injured in the derailment that occurred Thursday morning just north of Nebraska City. He says the train was shipping coal to the company's plant located south of the city.

Union Pacific spokesman Mark Davis says crews wrapped up track repairs and coal cleanup early Friday morning. He says the train was able to transport the remainder of the coal and the spilled coal would be shipped by truck.

Davis says he doesn't know what cause the 135-car train carrying coal from Wyoming to the plant to derail.

Panel Approves Transportation Bill

PIERRE, S.D. (AP) — A roughly \$50 million state Senate transportation funding package that's close to Gov. Dennis Daugaard's proposal is headed to the full chamber after breezing through its first test in a Friday committee hearing.

The Senate State Affairs Committee considered a modified form of the governor's plan, which would raise transportation funding through a variety of increases in fuel taxes, fees and other assessments. It replaced a much larger \$100 million plan in the Senate that fell by the wayside as lawmaker support coalesced around something close to Daugaard's proposal.

The debate over transportation funding is perhaps the most significant issue of the 2015 legislative session.

The committee's proposal would end the 2-cent fuel tax increases, which the governor had proposed as ongoing, in 2023. Lawmakers added in about \$1.5 million for local infrastructure through vehicle fee increases that would start

The committee also expanded a wheel tax that could raise \$400,000 if fully implemented at the local level and limited a registration fee increase for noncommercial

Nebraska Nurse Practitioner Bill Wins

LINCOLN, Neb. (AP) — A bill to lift restrictions on nurse practitioners has won initial approval from Nebraska

Senators voted 35-2 on Friday to advance the measure through a first-round vote. An identical bill was passed last year but vetoed by then-Gov. Dave Heineman after lawmakers adjourned for the year.

The bill would remove a requirement that nurse practitioners secure a written agreement to consult with a doctor before they can practice in Nebraska. The agreements are designed to ensure a physician is available if a patient doesn't respond to treatment.

Supporters of the bill say the requirement makes it harder to keep nurse practitioners in Nebraska. The Nebraska Medical Association says it opposes the bill because of concerns about patient safety.




