# **Area Legislators React To Death Penalty Decision**

Area South Dakota legislators were divided on Wednesday's committee votes which defeated two measures to repeal or revise the death penalty.

On both bills, District 16 Sen. Dan Lederman (R-Dakota Dunes) voted with the 7-2 majority in the Senate State Affairs Committee to defer the bills to the 41st day of the session. The procedural move means the legislation died in committee.

On the other side, District 18 Sen. Bernie Hunhoff (D-Yankton) and District 21 Sen. Billie Sutton (D-Burke) cast the two votes supporting each bill.

In addition, District 17 Sen. Art Rusch (R-Vermillion), a retired circuit court judge, testified in favor of repealing the death penalty. He spoke from the perspective of a judge presiding over the trial of Donald Moeller for the 1990 murder of 9year-old Becky O'Connell in Sioux Falls.

"I testifiied as the first — and I believe only — legislator who has personally tried a death penalty case and sentenced a man to death," he told the *Press* & Dakotan. "I tried to explain its effect on me, on the jurors and the financial effect on Lincoln County.

"I came out of the trial not the supporter of the death penalty that I had been going into it. Even now, 17 years after I sentenced Donald Moeller to death, it still has an emotional effect on me.

Lederman told the Press & Dakotan he found the committee hearings to be 'nerve racking" and that he didn't have extensive comment. In the end, he voted his conscience on the bills, he said.

"I feel very strongly in favor of the death penalty," he said. "My faith and morals direct me to feel that compensation is necessary to victims, especially in capital offense cases.

On the other side of the issue, Hunhoff

served as a prime sponsor — along with the District 9 Rep. Steve Hickey (R-Sioux Falls) of the bill to repeal the death penalty. Hickey serves as pastor of a Sioux Falls church.

"The death penalty causes more problems than it solves," Hunhoff

said Hunhoff described Rusch's testimony as "especially telling," and noted those testifying included another judge-turnedlegislator, District 31 Rep. Timothy Johns

'Also, two former attorneys general of South Dakota testified - Mark Meierhenry and Roger Tellinghuisen," Hunhoff said. Both faced death penalty cases, and both said those experiences changed their minds about the death penalty.

No evidence exists that the death penalty serves as a deterrent, Hunhoff

"In fact, death penalty states generally have much higher murder rates than states without the death penalty," he said. "And we're in bad company globally. Not a single country in Europe or the Americas has a death penalty. The United States is in league with North Korea, Iran, Iraq and China on this issue.

"But perhaps the most troubling aspect is that we run the risk of someday executing an innocent person. It happened early in state history when we hanged a man who was later found to be innocent. In fact, he was hung three times because the execution failed on the first

Since the U.S. Supreme Court allowed states to re-instate the death penalty in 1976, 150 death row prisoners have been exonerated, Hunhoff said.

'That's one exoneration for every

nine executions, an alarming rate of error," he said.

Hunhoff also questioned government's role in administering the death penalty.

"I'm just not comfortable with a government so big and powerful that it can kill its citizens," he said. "I'm not comfort-

able with government having that power.' Denny Davis of Vermillion, the head of the organization South Dakota for Alternatives to the Death Penalty, noted Wednesday's Senate committee votes fell along

party lines. "It was sad to see how not one Republican voted with us on any of these bills," he said. "It makes me wonder just how pro-life' this state really is.'

Davis views the death penalty debate as a moral issue.

"I believe all life is sacred and everyone gets a chance at life no matter what they have done," he said. "The death penalty is not about what 'they' have done but what we do. This is our

response to killing. What does that say about us as citizens and as people of

SB 122, the bill to revise provisions of the death penalty, also received bipartisan sponsor-ship. Area legislators who introduced the bill included Hunhoff, Sutton, Rusch and District 19 Rep. Kyle Schoenfish (R-Scotland).
