NEW ORLEANS — South Dakota men's and women's cross country teams and Coyote junior Amber Eichkorn have earned All-Academic honors, according to a release by the U.S. Track and Field/Cross Country Coaches Association on Wednesday.

Eichkorn was among 153 women in Division I to earn individual All-Academic honors. To be eligible, the honorees must have a cumulative GPA of at least 3.25 and have finished in the top 15 at the NCAA Regionals or as an All-American at the NCAA Championships.

The Wichita, Kan., native was the top Coyote finisher all fall. Her accolades include a runner-up finish at the Summit League Championships, 10th place at the NCAA Midwest Regional meet, qualifying for the NCAA Championships and earning academic all-Summit League honors. To receive All-Academic team status, a program must have a cumulative team GPA of 3.0 or higher and have at least five runners start in a NCAA regional championship.

Celebrated Little League Team **Stripped Of Title**

CHICAGO (AP) — A Little League team that captured the attention of the nation and the hearts of its hometown was stripped of its national title Wednesday after an investigation revealed that team officials had falsified boundaries so they could add ineligible players to the roster.

Only last summer, the all-black Jackie Robinson West team was the toast of Chicago and was honored with trips to San Francisco and to the White House.

But the sport's governing body announced that team officials had engaged in a Little League version of political gerrymandering. Instead of politicians redrawing district maps to pick up votes, it was local league officials who changed the boundaries that determined where players must live. And after learning that their scheme had been exposed, they scrambled to persuade surrounding leagues to go along with what they had done.

'This is so heartbreaking," said Stephen D. Keener, president and CEO of Little League International. "It is a sad day for a bunch of kids who we have come to really like ... who did nothing wrong." But "we cannot tolerate the actions of some of the adults involved here.'



2010), which houses the football program and is equipped with classrooms, a weight room, an academic room and coaches offices.

• The \$32-million Sanford-Jackrabbit Athletic Complex (SJAC), which opened last fall, houses a 300-meter track and a 100-yard football field with a soy-based synthetic turf.

• And Coughlin-Alumni Stadium — to be newlynamed Dana Dykhouse Stadium — is being renovated to increase seating to 19,340 and will be ready for the 2016 season.

Such things may not have been the ultimate deciding factor for recruits, but they certainly didn't hurt, Hale said.

'The indoor facility is obviously a big thing for me being a kicker, being able to practice year-round," he said.

The east and south side grandstands are on track to be completed by the fall of this year, with the entire complex slated for a fall 2016 completion.

Unlike the Dykhouse Center and SJAC, there were only renderings and schematics for recruits to look at during visits.

"That was something I never expected, but once I found out, it was an added bonus," Hale said of the stadium.

Admittedly, there's not much of a 'sell' that needs to be done when a recruit can see the amenities for themselves, Stiegelmeier said.

"We could sell the facilities a lot harder than we do. but they sell themselves," he said. "But it's the people that mark you."

Not to mention success.

South Dakota State, coming off a 9-5 season, has reached the second round of the FCS playoffs each of the last three years — twice falling to eventual national champion North Dakota State.

"Their goal every year is to win the conference, and then build on that," Hale said. "Ultimately they're striving for the national championship.

And the three Yankton recruits know all about working for a title, having won a Class 11AA championship as sen-

"Over four years in Yankton, that's something we strived for, and finally accomplished," Hale said.

Three Yankton Recruits

Each of the last three years Stiegelmeier has visited Yankton after National Signing Day he has had a local recruit to talk about.

And Wednesday, he had three, in Hale, Fitzgerald and Greeneway.

Hale signed as a scholarship punter for the Jackrabbits, while Fitzgerald (a defensive end) and Greeneway (tight end) also plan to join the football program.

"Obviously they've had success, and success breads focus on one sport and put excitement about the sport on weight, at our level of footand hard work," Stiegelmeier ball, you see amazing things said. "In football, success doesn't happen by chance. Stiegelmeier said.

"It's a call here, it's hard work, it's summers, and coach (Arlin) Likness does a great job.'

Needing help at the punter spot with the graduation of Ethan Sawyer, SDSU scanned the region for one, Stiegelmeier said.

And he was the best

one," the coach said of Hale. "Honestly, he may be a better field goal kicker than a punter, but when he zeroes in on punting, initially, I think the sky's going to be the limit.

In the case of Greeneway and Fitzgerald, Stiegelmeier was quick to point out that SDSU has 13 players who signed as non-scholarship recruits but are now on scholarship.
