Water Disposal Site Draws Opposition

GERING, Neb. (AP) — Scotts Bluff County's commissioners don't like the location of a proposed disposal well for fracking water in nearby Sioux County and have appealed for help from a state regulatory board.

The commissioners on Tuesday approved a letter to the Nebraska Oil and Gas Commission, which has scheduled a March 24 public hearing on the proposal. The county commissioners cited concerns about wear and tear on county roads and state highways.

"We have additional concerns about potential damage to our groundwater," the letter said. "Western Nebraska does not need this well nor this activity."

Terex Energy Corp., of Broomfield, Colorado, wants to haul the saltwater recovered from oil searches and production in Wyoming and Colorado to a Nebraska ranch about 14 miles north of Mitchell.

expense will only pile up. "It's going to be more expensive to keep up our roads if we wait just a few years, even," he said. "It'll be like a snowball rolling downhill, gaining size and speed as it goes, and we can't allow that to happen."

Under the governor's proposal, the vehicle excise tax would be raised from 3 to 4 percent to raise \$27,200,000 in the first year, increasing the motor fuel tax by two cents each year through 2030 to bring in \$13,750,000 in the first year, a 10 percent in vehicle registration costs for local entities bringing in \$7,400,000, increasing registration fees for non-commercial trucks to 70 percent of commercial rates (they currently pay 60 percent of commercial rates) in 2015 and 80 percent in 2016 and beyond. This is set to bring in \$9,900,000 in the first year. Each year, \$15 million would be set aside as a bridge fund for the counties. In total, the proposal hopes to bring in \$50,850,000 in its first year.

The proposal, Senate Bill 1, could go to a House committee vote on Friday.

Daugaard said the situation is too important to take a cheap approach.

"The cheap person would say, 'Hey, we can get by without spending money for another four, five, six years — let's not raise taxes,'" he said. "That's the cheap way, but the problem with that is it ignores the fact a frugal person recognizes — when you spend a little bit of money now, you can really save a lot of money in the long run in circumstances like this one. If we address this problem, we can do it with a modest increase, and it will be easy for consumers to manage, and yet, it will seize the opportunity to spend modest amounts on maintenance when we have our roads in good and excel-

that the South Dakota National Guard had not had a unit deployed overseas. For 13 straight years, there has been a South Dakota unit overseas."

At one point, the SDNG had more than 2,000 members deployed into combat at the same time, Deiss said. The SDNG has deployed about 7,200 service members since 9/11, he noted. Some members volunteered for missions outside their units, and a number of members served second and third deployments, he added.

The upcoming deployment will occur in an area vital to the war on terror, Deiss said.

"Kuwait is a major hub for the U.S. military throughout the Middle East," he said. "They (the 155th members) are there to help build up the infrastructure of various bases within the country."

THE MISSION AHEAD

The 155th serves as a vertical engineer company, specializing in structures, Deiss said. The 155th holds a wide variety of occupational specialties including carpentry, plumbing, electrical and masonry services.

The unit is capable of providing engineer support in the construction of base camps and internment facilities. In addition, the unit can construct, repair and maintain other vertical infrastructures in support of units within a brigade combat team, division or corps.

With its upcoming deployment, the Wagner unit will serve a mission different than its normal activities, Deiss said.

"This mission is unique in that they are a horizontal engineering unit," he said. "The horizontal units, like the 842nd (Engineer Company) in the Black Hills, have the earth-moving equipment and

are building roads, airfields and forward (arming and refueling) points."

However, the Wagner unit is fully ready to take on the demands of the Kuwait mission, Deiss said.

"Like a lot of engineering types of units, they may normally work horizontal, but they also work vertical," he said.

The SDNG members bring a great deal of experience to the mission, Deiss said. He noted both their civilian jobs and the engineering and construction projects they have completed for their SDNG community relations program.

"They have done some of these community-type service projects all over the state through the years," he said. "They have a vast amount of real-world training experience."

The Wagner unit is currently preparing for deployment by fulfilling different training requirements during monthly drills and other times, Deiss said. In addition, the soldiers are taking care of administrative issues, such as medical and dental records along with other paperwork.

When deployed, the soldiers will head to Fort Bliss for several weeks of combat training, Deiss said. The simulations include conducting a convoy and reacting if under fire or if encountering an Improvised Explosive Device (IED). They will also receive training on infrastructure evaluation.

The Wagner unit isn't unfamiliar with combat missions, as the 153rd Engineer Battalion deployed to Iraq in support of Operation Iraqi Freedom from Dec. 7, 2003, to June 3, 2005.

Although combat engineers by trade, the 153rd also conducted non-typical combat engineer tasks during its first tour, a news release said. Those tasks ranged from general facility maintenance to operating a detention facility for more than six months.

PREPARING A SEND-OFF

As for the upcoming Kuwait mission, the unit holds a deployment target of next August, Deiss said. When the date is finalized, arrangements will be made for a deployment ceremony at the unit headquarters in Rapid City. An invitation to attend will be extended to Wagner officials as well as other interested persons from the home community, he added.

While the official ceremony will be held in Rapid City, the Wagner unit could hold a smaller ceremony in its home community, Deiss said.

During the deployment, families will receive support from the Yellow Ribbon Program through its Family Readiness Groups, he said. "Usually, there's one (such program) in each community where there is a unit, but they might have other groups if there are a lot of the military families living in other communities," he added.

With its upcoming mission, the Wagner unit will continue a strong SDNG presence in the war on terror, Deiss said.

"For the last decade plus, the South Dakota National Guard has (more than pulled) its weight compared to a lot of states with its amount of service members deployed in the war in Iraq and Afghanistan," he said.

"Even though we're one of the smallest (state) National Guards, we're one of the higher deployment rates. It shows (that our) National Guard has quality units. The U.S. Army looks at sending our units because they are always well trained and ready to go."

"It says a lot not only about the organization but also the men and women who wear the uniform as well."

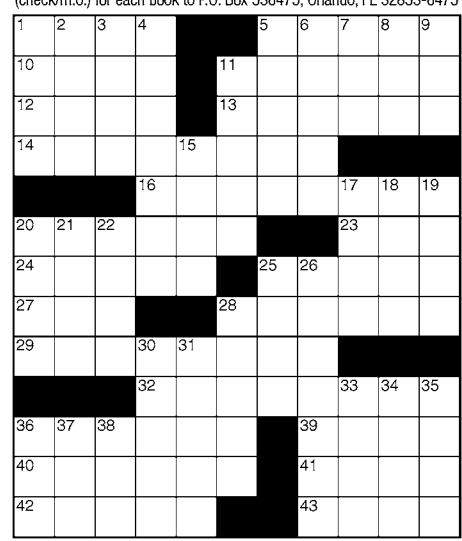
