TEA — The Region 2A Tournament was a new experience to many of the wrestlers for Yankton High School.

And after seeing 11 of his 12 wrestlers advance to the second day with a chance to advance to the state tournament, head coach Ryan Hage was understandably pleased with his young group.

"It's a new experience for a majority of these guys," Hage said after Thursday night's action at the Region 2A Tournament in Tea.

"And they came out and wrestled well."

Yankton, which sits in sixth place, saw two wrestlers reach the finals in their respective weight classes, Cody Vornhagen at 113 pounds and Spencer Huber at 126 in record-breaking fashion.

The other nine wrestlers advanced to the consolation semifinals, needing a win in tonight's (Tuesday) first round

to qualify for state. Bashir Abd-Al-Kreem (120), Skylar Elle (132), Luke Lammers (138), Jamee Bruegman (145), Jordan Lucht (152), Ray Wermers (160), Brock Folkers (195), Cole Diedrichsen (220) and Reese Anderson (285) all rebounded from first-round losses to move forward in the consolation bracket.

The only Yankton wrestler not to move on to the second day of action was Kyle Schmidt, who lost twice at 170.

"The kids are giving us effort," Hage said. "Those guys on the back side know it's going to take a win in the first

round to get to state.' The other highlight of the night for the Bucks was Huber setting the school record for pins in a season. The topranked wrestler at 126 won twice by fall Thursday and now stands at 27 for the season breaking the previous YHS record of 26 by Andy Johnson.

"That's a notable thing for Spencer," Hage said. "It's definitely a goal he had in mind."
