With apologies to Denver, which made a surprise run to the title game a year ago, women's basketball in the Summit League has been a 2-team battle over the past three years. South Dakota State and the University of South Dakota. The former won five consecutive post-season tournament championships, the last of which saw a win over the latter, while USD won the title last year. Other teams like Western Illinois and IUPUI, and yes even Denver, have proven they'd certainly be capable of winning three straight games in March. And yet, the Jackrabbits and Coyotes have emerged. This season has only magnified that point. South Dakota leads the conference at 12-3, one game ahead of SDSU, and can clinch the out-

right regular season title today (Saturday) with a win over Western Illinois. The Jacks, meanwhile, sit at 11-4 and will be the No. 2 seed for the tournament. The Coyotes wouldn't exactly say as much, but it'd be significant for them to win the regular season title. Why? They've had problems the previous two years getting out of the gates strong in the league season, both times needing a late surge to get going. A year ago, USD went 7-7 in the regular season, and needed a last-second three-pointer to win in the first round of the tournament — then rolling past SDSU and beating Denver for the title. And so, potentially going 13-3, with two extra league games (with the re-addition of Oral Roberts) is a significant jump for a team that had the target on its back all season. Whether that results in a second straight Summit League championship, we'll have to see — I wouldn't put it past SDSU, Western Illinois or IUPUI putting together three wins in a row for the title. Either way, stay tuned. You'll be in for a treat starting next weekend in Sioux Falls.

MMC Women Sign North Bend PG

The Mount Marty College women's basketball program signed Taylor Fallin, a 5-foot-5 point guard from North Bend Central High School (Nebraska), the institution announced Friday. Fallin is a four-year letter winner and part of a basketball program that qualified for the state tournament last year. Adding to her athletic accolades, Fallin has been on the honor roll all four years of high school, is National Honor Society Vice President, named Academic All-State for basketball and softball. This season, Fallin averages 5.9 points per game and is shooting 42 percent from the three point range with 1.2 steals per game. "Taylor will bring good work ethic and experience to our team," MMC head coach Tom Schlingens said. "She is a natural athlete that works hard and is an all-around great recruit. She will repre-

Indoor Track: O'Connell Wins Long Jump

FARGO, N.D. — Two-time Summit League long jump champion senior Jeff O'Connell claimed his third title during the first day of the Summit League Indoor Track and Field Championships. The South Dakota men end the day in first place of the team standings while the women enter day two in second. O'Connell jumped 23 feet, 11 inches to capture the event and topped junior teammate Teivaskie Lewin who reached 23-6 1/4 for second. The Coyotes also received points from junior Josh Petersen and freshman Tayler Anderson in sixth and seventh, respectively. South Dakota added another 23 points in the men's pole vault. Junior Peter Chapman broke a three-way tie at 16-9 1/4 for second place. Freshman Jake David and senior Kevin Sarekhani placed third and fourth, respectively,

at the same height with finishes based on attempts. Junior Erik Jorgensen added a fifth-place finish at a new personal-best height of 16-3 1/4. The men's distance medley relay of senior Stephen Nielson, senior Lukas Bernard, freshman Aaron Breyer and senior Brant Haase finished runner-up with a time of 10:17.99. Senior Kyle McKelvey threw a personal best of 58-9 1/2 in the weight throw for third. In the men's heptathlon, Petersen finished day one in second place with 2,693 points and less than 100 points out of first. Three events remain on day two. The Coyote women scored 23 points in the 3,000-meter run and set a new school record in the event. Junior Amber Eichkorn led the way when she finished runner-up

with a record-breaking time of 9:36.75. Third place was earned by junior Kelsey Barrett who ran almost 30 seconds faster than her personal record to clock 9:46.64. Junior Katie Wetzstein took fourth in 9:51 and freshman Bethany Kozak was fifth in 9:52.44. After the scoring of the first five events, South Dakota's men enter day two in the lead with 60 points. North Dakota State is in second with 55 and South Dakota State trails with 26. The top spots are reversed on the women's side with North Dakota State leading South Dakota 77-47. South Dakota State is in third place with 38 points. The championships resume today (Saturday) at 9:30 a.m. with the men's heptathlon. Field events are scheduled to start at noon and the track events resume at 1 p.m.

Butler Leads Bulls Past T'Wolves 96-89

CHICAGO (AP) — The Chicago Bulls got a positive update on Derrick Rose, and then used another big night by Jimmy Butler to beat the Minnesota Timberwolves 96-89 on Friday. Butler had 28 points and 12 rebounds and Chicago won for the seventh time in its last nine games. Mike Dunleavy made five 3-pointers on

his way to 21 points, and Joakim Noah finished with 11 points, 12 rebounds and eight assists. The Bulls trailed 85-84 before Kirk Hinrich drove inside for a layup with 4:29 remaining, and then Tony Snell made a smart pass to Dunleavy for an open 3 that made it 89-85. Butler added a clutch bank shot to help Chicago improve to 10-1 in its last 11 games against Minnesota. Kevin Martin scored 18 points for the Timberwolves, who have lost four of six. Ricky Rubio had 15 points and 10 assists, and Andrew Wiggins finished with 14 points. Minnesota was hurt by a whopping 48-16 deficit in points in the paint.
