ON THIS DATE

75 YEARS AGO

Saturday, January 2, 1937

- While Yankton, along with other communities the country over celebrated New Year's Eve in a more extensive manner than at any time since the start of the Depression, New Year's Day was decidedly a quiet one throughout the city, partly due to the heavy all-day snowfall.
- The South Dakota highway commission spent \$4,638,678.58 on various types of road construction work during the 1935-36 fiscal year ended last June 30.

50 YEARS AGO

Tuesday, January 2, 1962

- Kelly's Cove, well known supper club along the James River east of Yankton, was leveled to the ground Sunday morning by a fire which rapidly consumed the frame structure. Although the cause of the fire is not known definitely, it appeared to have started from a propane gas explosion.
- 1961 bowed out of Pierre and Central South Dakota with a shake, rattle and a rumble. An earthquake, without major damage, shook the area surrounding the capital city with strong vibrations. The thing that gave the area the shakes around 10:35 a.m. Sunday was officially confirmed as an earthquake.

25 YEARS AGO

Friday, January 2, 1987

- Gov. William Janklow said he doesn't want anything to do with federal bureaucracy and turned down a job offer in the Reagan Administration.
- The 2.1 million American men who reached age 26 last year are over the hill as far as the Selective Service System is concerned. With the new year, men who had to register with the system in 1980 when they turned 20 are now ineligible for a draft because they are too old to qualify.

"That was a fun phone call with him," Robinson said. "I asked him what his job was and what kind of schooling he needed for that, because I was curious. He said people skills and writing were important."

With those skills already in hand for Robinson, the opportunity was a nice stepping stone to exposing him to the professional world of reporting and media relations, Mandel said.

"He just has a natural voice for sportswriting," she said. "He stepped right in at the paper and showed he has a talent for this."

Tom said of their 36-year marriage. "We've always been partners in what we do."

While he attended graduate school throughout most of the 1980s, she worked to support their family.

Tom began working at L&CBHS in 1994, when it had about 34 employees.

"Now, there are about 120 employees," he said. "The budget has grown from \$1 million to more than \$6 million, not counting Sir Charles, which adds a couple million more."

In recent years, Stanage was involved in overseeing the multi-million dollar renovation of Sir Charles Apartments in downtown Yankton into long-term affordable housing for L&CBHS patients.

He is also spearheading the effort to get a Federally Qualified Health Center in Yankton, a facility that would provide primary care to those with little or no ability to pay.

"The Stanages are tireless volunteers," said Mark, Lois, Kyle and Kate Halbur Katterhagen in their nomination for the Stanages to be Citizens of the Year. "There is hardly an organization in town that the Stanages have not served over the years. ... The Stanages are quiet but visionary leaders in this community."

Jack Lyons wrote specifically of Tom's efforts to improve Yankton in his nomination.

"(He) has worked tirelessly and quietly for many years in the Yankton community to help those in need," Lyons stated. "He has been instrumental in providing affordable housing, counseling, supervision and work experiences for those who are capable. The lives of many have been enriched under Tom's leadership."

Tom said that community mental health has always been in his blood because his uncle, Dr. Frank Haas, was a superintendent at the South Dakota Human Services Center.

"My first real employment other than Gurney's was at the Human Services Center," he said. "I started working there when I

a good job, he said.

"I'm the mom and grandmother. I'm all about family," Jo Anne said.

The Stanages also attribute their success and happiness to living in Yankton.

"Our roots are here," Tom said. "I don't think there is a nicer place to live in terms of the community, in terms of the things to do."

Jo Anne added, "It's a beautiful city, and people care. Everywhere you look, you find people giving, sharing and teaching. The city keeps moving forward and doesn't move backward."
