County Sirens Operational Again, To Be Tested

Yankton County's outdoor emergency sirens are operational again after an upgrade that began in late December.

Control boards in all 14 sirens were replaced in order to become compatible with the narrowband radio system conversion the county is undergoing as part of a federal mandate.

On Thursday, Jan. 12, the sirens will be tested to make sure they work properly. The testing will include a fire tone, storm tone and attack tone.

The exercise will commence at 10 a.m. with the sirens in Yankton, Mission Hill and Riverside Acres. At 10:15 a.m., the Gayville siren will be tested, the Volin siren test will be at 11 and the Lesterville test will be at 11:15 a.m.

Man Injured In Tractor Accident Near Gayville

GAYVILLE — A man was air-lifted Monday after being run over by a tractor east of Gayville.

The incident was reported at 2:30 p.m., according to Gayville Fire Chief Gary Jepsen.

"The guy was operating a John Deere tractor and was in the process of pulling small trees out of a ditch," he said. "He said he put it in park, got out of the tractor and when he was in the process of hooking the chain up to the tree ... the tractor rolled

down the hill and drove over him."

The tractor had dual tires on it, which are what ran over the man. He was not struck by the front tires.

The accident occurred north-east of the intersection of 454th Avenue and 311th Street.

Jepsen said the injuries sustained were serious, and the man was airlifted from the scene.

The Clay County Sheriff's Office, Vermillion-Clay County Ambulance Department and the South Dakota Highway Patrol were also on the scene.
