

Petitions For Partisan Office Available

PIERRE — Secretary of State Jason Gant has noted petitions for partisan office are able to be taken out and turned in to the respective election supervisors for a number of elections that are set for the ballot in 2012.

“Our office has been assisting many candidates in filling out their petitions for the ballot, and I’d like to remind people that with most all offices on partisan ballots, petitions were able to be taken out starting on the first of January, and they are due back into their respective election officers no later than 5 p.m. on the 27th of March,” Gant said. “My office has started receiving the first of our petitions being returned for validation, with many more to come before March 27th.”

“Petitions may be circulated for U.S. House of Representatives, the offices of all 105 Legislators (35 Senate and 70 House seats), County Commissioners, County Treasurer, County State’s Attorney, County Coroner, and delegates to both the Republican and Democrat state conventions,” Gant said. “I encourage everyone considering a run for office to give themselves sufficient time to collect and turn in petitions, in case they fall short on signatures. Once March 27 passes, it’s too late.”

Gant noted, “We are already announcing candidates who have successfully submitted their petitions on our facebook page at <http://www.facebook.com/SOSGant>, as well as our regular website at <http://sdsos.gov/elections>.”

Gov. Asks For Flags at Half-Staff For Janklow

PIERRE — Gov. Dennis Daugaard asks that all flags in South Dakota be flown at half-staff, immediately, in honor of former Gov. Bill Janklow, who died Thursday.

The governor requests that flags be lowered to half-staff until the day of former Gov. Janklow’s interment, which is pending.

The flag is customarily displayed from sunrise to sunset, but may be displayed for 24 hours a day if properly illuminated during the hours of darkness.

Heineman has said the cuts account for less than 2 percent of local budgets and urged local governments to cut spending.

“It’s sort of like being kicked when you’re already down,” said Dix, referring to cuts last year in state aid to counties. “All this is going to do is shift that revenue, and the only way it can be made up is through property taxes. Very rarely do you walk into a coffee shop and hear people complaining about an inheritance tax. What you hear is people complaining about high property taxes.”

Speaker of the Legislature Mike Flood said he was pleased the governor promised to include input from many groups in solving the problems. He said no one bill would be able to handle the issue.

“The governor left the door wide open for conversation,” he said. “No line was drawn in the sand today.”

Flood said he still needed to study the governor’s plan in detail.

“It’s going to get a good discussion,” Flood said. “I like the idea of middle-class tax relief.”

there was no need to prepare a full-blown environmental impact statement. The board’s consideration of the permit and the conditions attached to the air quality permit took into account all relevant environmental issues, she said.

“This is not some made-up analysis. This is a very rigorous analysis,” Giedd said.

Barnett said he will issue a decision soon because he knows the case will be appealed to the South Dakota Supreme Court. He said he will rule on whether the board applied the law correctly or made any clear errors in assessing facts in the permit.

The revised air quality permit approved by the state Board of Minerals and Environment also extended the deadline for starting construction until March 2013.

Hyperion’s proposed refinery north of Elk Point would process 400,000 barrels of Canadian tar sands crude oil each day into low-sulfur gasoline, diesel, jet fuel and liquid petroleum gas. It would be the first new U.S. oil refinery built since 1976.

The project would include a power plant that produces electricity for the refinery. It would use a byproduct of the refinery process, solid petroleum coke, which would be burned into gas and burned to produce electrical power.

Hyperion, based in Texas, contends the refinery would be a clean, modern plant that would use the most advanced, commercially feasible emission control technology.

The Sierra Club and two local groups, Save Union County and Citizens Opposed to Oil Pollution, argue the refinery could emit too much pollution and hurt the quality of life in the rural area.

50 YEARS AGO

Saturday, January 13, 1962
• Much damage to houseboats in the Gavins Point dam tailwaters has been reported as a result of the rise in the water level caused by freezing of the Missouri River west of the Yankton bridge for the first time since completion of Gavins Point Dam. Most of the boats were frozen in and could not float up with the rising water.
• A delegation from Watertown was told Wednesday there was good possibility to get four-lane traffic from proposed Interstate 29 west justified for federal aid urban funds.

25 YEARS AGO

Tuesday, January 13, 1987
• Gov. George Mickelson, in his first State of the State address, today urged the Legislature to raise the state sales tax by 1 percent for one year to help provide low-interest loans to promote economic development.
• Since the Thanksgiving holiday, there have been almost 100 incidents of vandalism reported in Yankton. Most of the damage occurred over the Thanksgiving, Christmas and New Year’s holidays, but more than a dozen incidents have been reported in the past week. Yankton Police are offering a \$200 reward to anyone with information about the outbreak.
