AMES, Iowa — Two Mount Marty College actors have advanced to the semi-final round at the Region V Kennedy Center American College Theatre Festival in Ames, Iowa.

both sides on whether or not reducing payroll taxes is an effective form of job creation.

"I, frankly, for one, am not a big fan of that policy," he said.

He also expressed a fear of removing the dedicated line of revenue for Social Security.

"Payroll taxes and Social Security taxes have been dedicated to Social Security," Thune said. "If you were to break that connection, you start reducing revenue that comes into that fund. It makes problem-solving for Social Security that much harder. That being said, the majority of the Congress wants to extend (the tax cuts) for a year, it is just the question of how that is done."

Following the meeting, Thune addressed two issues that will directly affect the Yankton area: how the Corps of Engineers will move forward following the historic flooding seen along the Missouri River this past summer, and a potential new farm bill.

Thune said he believed the Corps of Engineers is continuing to work and act responsibly, but there are things it can change to do better in the future.

"I think (this past summer) was an unprecedented weather situation, but on the other hand, I do believe there were things that could have been done that made it a lot less worse than it was," he said. "I am not sure the Corps has ever owned up to that. That being said, (the question is) what we do going forward. At least lately they have demonstrated more of a responsiveness to the suggestions being made about insuring that the incident that happened last summer doesn't happen again. We are going to work with them and hold them accountable."

Noting that Congress does not have direct oversight of the Corps short of rewriting its operations manual, Thune did say he would encourage Corps officials to develop new models for determining the amount of moisture in the plains states.

"I think (the Corps) has measured the snow pack in the moun-
