



He also expressed a fear of removing the dedicated line of revenue for Social Security.

"Payroll taxes and Social Security taxes have been dedicated to Social Security," Thune said. "If you were to break that connection, you start reducing revenue that comes into that fund. It makes problem-solving for Social Security that much harder. That being said, the majority of the Congress wants to extend (the tax cuts) for a year, it is just the question of how that is done.

Following the meeting, Thune addressed two issues that will directly affect the Yankton area: how the Corps of Engineers will move forward following the historic flooding seen along the Missouri River this past summer, and a potential new farm bill.

Thune said he believed the Corps of Engineers is continuing to work and act responsibly, but there are things it can change to do better in the future.

"I think (this past summer) was an unprecedented weather situation, but on the other hand, I do believe there were things that could have been done that made it a lot less worse than it was," he said. "I am not sure the Corps have ever

derestimated the amount of water that was on the plains this past year," he said. "I think they need to acknowledge that their current models don't work. There seems to be a willingness to at least recognize some of those things, and I hope we will continue to see that kind of attitude. We do have to keep them accountable and make sure that they are moving forward in a way that makes sure this doesn't happen in the future.'

In regards to a new farm bill, Thune was happy with the work that has been done in special committee, but he doubts any real headway will be made towards writing a new farm bill this session.

There is a body of work that would serve as a foundation for a farm bill that we might be able to get put on the floor this year," he said. "But, it is going to be hard to pass and will be especially hard to pass in the House of Representatives.'

He did note that the current farm bill expires at the end of 2012, forcing Congress to either extend it or pass a new piece of legislation.

"I hope we can use the work that was done going into super-committee to come up with a farm bill that achieves savings - that is significantly less expensive than what we have today — but still provide the necessary safety net for our farmers and ranchers in the event we have a really bad turn of weather or economic conditions in agriculture," he said.

"There just isn't a lot of appetite for a farm bill right now with the budgetary circumstances we are fac-


