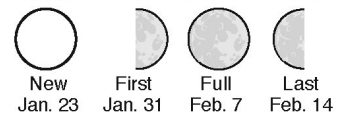

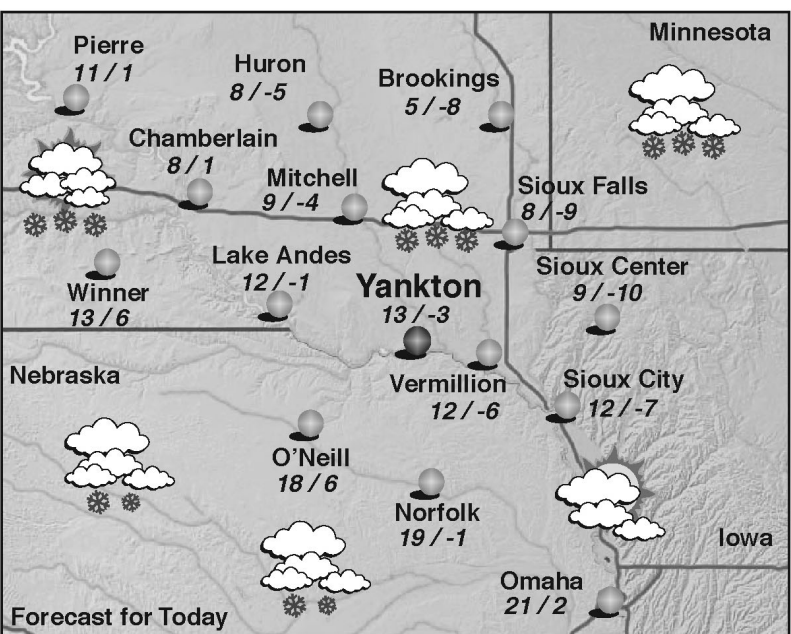

we are here for a lot of reasons — but at the top is doing well in your academic areas. We set the bar high, but as I read off all the accomplishments of our school, it is clear our students do very, very well. Our community should be very proud of that and support them.”

Powell said that the student successes like those achieved by this year's class deserve recognition.

“I think we hear a lot about students that may be struggling and have issues, but sometimes we don't hear about our students who are doing well and working hard,” she said. “We have a lot of students that are doing very well, and this group of students is doing very well. It is nice to see them up there and recognized.”

- Spending 36 hours snow-bound in a country school house was the experience of Coach V. E. Montgomery, Prof. Arch Crawford, and Prof. Earnest Schlick, members of Southern Normal faculty following a trip to Yankton last Wednesday afternoon. The men went to Yankton late Wednesday to see the college basketball game and on the way home were stuck in snowdrifts several times but managed to reach the Daisy Valley school house, 7 miles north of Springfield.

50 YEARS AGO

Saturday, January 20, 1962

- The cabin and contols were burned out in a snow flanger car in a fire started by a vagrant at the Milwau-

kee railroad's roundhouse east of the city shortly after 11 o'clock Friday night. Both city and rural fire trucks were taken to the scene to get the fire under control.

- The cold, cold shooting Yankton Bucks hit only four field goals and 18 points in the first three periods of play, as they gave a 40 to 27 decision to the Golden Eagles of Aberdeen in ESD conference play here last night.

- The relatively mild weather so far this winter has allowed farmers and ranchers to do some work they usually don't get to do this time of year, Jim Hanson, Tripp County extension agent, said Monday. The good weather has given farmers the chance to catch up on odd jobs like fencing, building repair and fixing machinery.
