has been the unseasonably warm, dry winter. The Plains region has seen record-setting temperatures and, until Thursday night's snow, relatively little precipitation.

The long-range forecast looks good for drawing down more water from the reservoirs, according to Doug Kluck with the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA).

The February forecast across the Missouri River basin calls for warmer-than-normal conditions for eastern South Dakota and Nebraska. The northwest part of the basin sees equal chances of above-, below- and near-normal conditions, he said.

For the long-range forecast through April, most of the basin sees an equal chance of above-, belowand near-normal temperatures and precipitation, Kluck said. The LaNina weather pattern that has been affecting the country is starting to wane, he said.

"For the months of February, March and April, there isn't a strong climate signature across the Missouri basin at this time." he said.

The recent cold wave has made a dramatic difference throughout the basin, Farhat said. Many reaches of the river froze over during the past week, as did five of the six mainstem reservoirs. Gavins Point froze Jan. 13, while Fort Randall froze Jan. 14.

Gavins Point's elevation dropped

about two feet in the last week because of the ice, Farhat said. The current elevation of 1,205.2 feet stands about two feet lower than the Corps would like at this time of year, she

The Gavins Point releases will remain at 22,000 cfs through February, compared to the average of 17,000 cfs, Farhat said. The higher releases will help move more water, she said.

"The mountain snowpack remains below normal throughout most of the Missouri River basin," Farhat said. "The amounts have been increasing this week as the LaNina system battering the Pacific is now moving eastward."

A small amount of snow remains in eastern South Dakota, but the National Weather Service says the Great Plains' snowmelt represents less than one inch of precipitation for much of the region, she said.

The weather conditions will continue to exert a dramatic impact on the Missouri River, Farhat said. The additional storage provides the Corps with additional flexibility for any high inflows in the upper basin and the ability to hold back additional water for major downstream events, she said.

While the Missouri River system has gained storage capacity, the Corps continues to watch for rising inflows this winter and spring, said Col. Robert Ruch, the Corps' Omaha District commander.

"We have the Big Sioux, Little Sioux and other tributaries south of Gavins Point Dam," he said. "The Big and Little Sioux are in an abnormally dry state right now. We are cau-

Following last year's flooding, the Corps recommitted itself to better communication with government officials, tribes, landowners and other stakeholders along the Missouri River, said Brig. General John McMahon, commander of the Corps' Northwestern Division.

The Corps is making good on that effort, McMahon said.

"We are mainly doing that (outreach) through the activities of the Missouri River flood task force that has state representatives, along with tribal and other federal agencies, in its membership," he said. "They have formed nine working groups that meet regularly, almost weekly."

With the end of the holidays and start of the new year, the Corps is stepping up its personal contacts with the governors of Missouri River basin states, McMahon said. The Corps is keeping the governors apprised of the flood control efforts, he said.

The communication effort also

The communication effort also reaches out to the general public, McMahon said. He is sitting today (Saturday) on a panel with Missouri farmers and others, talking about the basin outlook and activities.

"You can never do enough in the area of interacting with people," he said.

And for the present time, the Corps has good news to share with the public, Farhat said.

"Everything is right where it should be," she said. "We are looking good right now."

VA Releases Personal Info Of 2,200 Vets

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Department of Veterans Affairs says personal information for more than 2,200 veterans, including Social Security numbers, was posted on Ancestry.com after it mistakenly released the data through the Freedom of Information Act.

The department said Friday there is no indication the information was misused, but it is still notifying all potentially affected veterans and is offering free credit monitoring. The department also said that Ancestry.com removed the information as soon as the VA alerted it to the department's mistake.

While the VA was required to release the requested records under the Freedom of Information Act, somehow information about living veterans was released as part of a database about deceased veterans. The department said it is investigating how the mistake happened.
