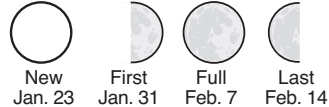

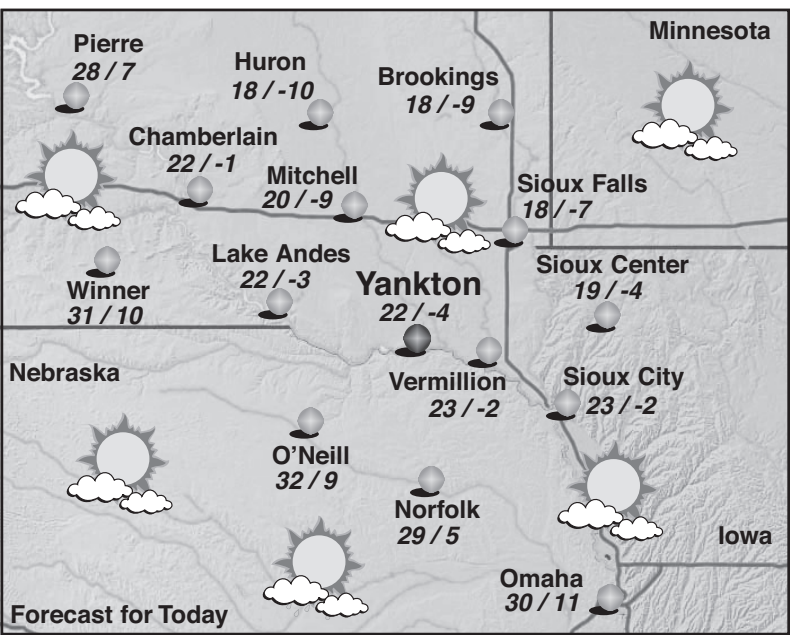

USD Distance Nursing Program Launches Mobile Simulation Unit

VERMILLION — Through funding from the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009, the University of South Dakota's A.S.N. Distance Nursing Program has unveiled a mobile simulation unit (MSU) featuring cutting-edge technology. The MSU, which weighs approximately 25,000 pounds and is 38 feet long, will be utilized for the first time on Wednesday, Jan. 25, in Waconia, Minn.

"Simulation provides nursing students a way to practice dealing with critical situations before dealing with real patients," stated faculty member Barbara Stolle, R.N., M.S. The MSU resembles mobile medical clinics or mobile diagnostic units, and will be used to provide students in the distance-learning program the opportunity to learn and practice nursing care skills and participate in patient care simulations. In addition to containing all of the technology used in a smart classroom and state-of-the-art equipment found in any modern simulation unit, including mannequins that talk, cough, produce heartbeats and breathe, the MSU also features video recording devices and a flat-screen viewing monitor in a multi-purpose debriefing area resembling a waiting room. The recording and viewing equipment allows students an

opportunity to view a live feed of the simulation or review recordings to examine their performance and enhance learning.

Besides serving students in primarily rural communities throughout the nine states where nursing students participate in clinical training through the USD A.S.N. Distance Nursing Program, usage of the MSU will be extended to partners of the distance nursing program: new graduate hires, incumbent staff RNs in cross-training, nurses pursuing competency validation and individuals involved in career advancement in high-risk nursing areas.

Built by LaBoit Inc. from Columbus, Ohio, which specializes in customized mobile vehicles that serve the medical, law enforcement, veterinary and emergency command fields, the MSU is entirely funded by a portion of a \$5 million grant from the Employment and Training Administrative/U.S. Department of Labor that was awarded to USD Nursing on March 1, 2010. Most of these grant funds will go toward recruitment efforts of unemployed veterans and military personnel with an interest in obtaining entry-level health care positions and completing the online USD A.S.N. Distance Nursing Program. Funds will also assist future nurse educators completing graduate degrees.

Saturday, January 23, 1937

- Due to a cave-in at the bottom of the city well and the partial clogging of the casing with sand, Menno is suffering a rather acute water shortage. E. H. Kuhlman, town clerk, states that while the old well is pumping enough water to keep mains filled, there is not enough available to get water into the city tank and the fire hazard is considerable.
- The sharp shooting of Maynard Ingalls, highly touted sophomore ace, snapped a prolonged losing streak for the University of South Dakota cagers last night at Vermillion as the Coyotes rallied late in the last half to chalk up a 33-25 victory over the Yankton college Greyhounds in a rough and ragged cage tangle.

50 YEARS AGO
Tuesday, January 23, 1962

- The resignation from the city commission of John Kabeiseman, effective March 1, and a discussion by the commission of possible annexation of additional area around the city limits were highlights of a session including a variety of topics Monday evening. Kabeiseman said that he will be moving outside the city limits this spring, and will no longer be eligible to serve as a city commissioner.
- The Milwaukee Arrow passenger train was involved Monday for a second time this month in a collision with a truck at the same grade crossing one mile north of Huron. The crash at 5:25 p.m. uncoupled the first of two engines but there was no derailment as there

had been on Jan. 11.

25 YEARS AGO
Friday, January 23, 1987

- The Yankton Chamber of Commerce is considering joining a new association to promote southeastern South Dakota. The group, Southeast Area Tourism Association, was initiated by the Sioux Falls Chamber because it did not feel that this corner of the state was being adequately promoted, Evan Nolte, executive director of the Sioux Falls Chamber, said Friday.
- Flandreau, not Sioux Falls, will be the home of a \$2.5 million publishing plant for a chain of weekly newspapers for Indian reservations across the Midwest, according to publisher Tim Giago. Giago, publisher of the *Lakota Times* in Martin, said he changed his mind after visiting with Flandreau Santee Sioux tribal officials.

classroom experience or not. "I think it is important that we do everything we can to get money into the classroom that is going to improve the classroom experience. If that is through the formula — if that is in some kind of a bonus, merit pay situation — if we are convinced it is going to provide better students, then I am all for it. If we are not, I can tell you it is going to be very difficult to get the money (for the program)." While Sen. Hunhoff said she expected the day to focus on education, Rep. Hunhoff was a bit surprised. "There are going to 500-600 bills out there with a lot of diverse issues," he said. "I am surprised but encouraged, I guess. I think it is the strength of Yankton that the community is focused on the important issues and not getting lost in the Obamacare

and other issues that they are probably focusing on in other parts of the state." While the meeting did focus on education, economic development and health care issues where clearly not far behind on the legislators' minds. "I do see Medicaid funding becoming a big issue again this session," Sen. Hunhoff said. "Last year, we set a new base. So you are not back to where you were before, so providers are still seeing a hit. Costs continue to escalate and go up; we are not coming back to where we were. I think that debate is going to continue to go on out there. "Charity care has escalated for all of the providers out there. There is an expectation when you are a not-for-profit that you do charity care, but it continues to escalate, because you have the people out there that can't afford to pay for the services. It then becomes, how do you continue to offer the services and do the things you need to do to meet the Medicaid needs of our population? We are still seeing that we are not getting the reim-

bursement rates that providers need." The other topics discussed were a need for regulation on synthetic marijuana, K2, and on the S.D. WINS program of economic development. "I think the S.D. WINS program is not only great for South Dakota, but I think it is particularly great for communities like Yankton," Moser said. "I am very excited about it." But, even that discussion returned to the education component. "We need to keep an open mind," Sen. Hunhoff said. "(The plans for education) are probably not perfect. We need to see if we can come to a decision. I think if anything is going to

change, the people affected are going to have to buy into the change, so it will be important to get the educators involved in the process." It was a statement Yankton Schools superintendent Joseph Gertsema agreed with following the meeting. "I was really pleased that the legislators had a good discussion about education," he said. "It sounds like all three of them are going to give the governor's proposal a fair look, and I think that is important. My hope is that if we discover this isn't a good idea, that the Legislature uses the scarce resources that we have in a way that will in fact improve student achievement."
