Mount Marty College is announcing the establishment of a new outreach initiative designed for adults of all ages. The newly established Center for Active Learners will serve to provide short courses for adults who wish to learn more about a variety of topics that are consistent with the liberal arts traditions of Mount Marty College.

The Center for Active Learning will operate within the framework of the Benedictine Institute for Leadership, Ethics and Social Justice which was founded in 2009 through an endowment from the Sisters of Sacred Heart Monastery.

The center's purpose is to provide educational outreach through short courses and seminars. The non-credit courses are designed for anyone who loves learning and enjoys the exchange of ideas without the pressures of homework or exams. Courses will consist of lectures and class discussions aimed at enriching the lives of individuals in the Yankton area.

Mount Marty College President Dr. Joseph Benoit sees the establishment of the Center as another opportunity for the institution to contribute to the quality of life in the region.

'The Center for Active Learners is directly aligned with the educational mission of Mount Marty College and reaffirms our commitment to life-long learning," he said in a press release. "Many individuals whom I have met in recent months have asked about opportunities for continuing education and I am pleased to be able to inform everyone that we are now able to respond to those requests."

The Center for Active Learners will offer courses beginning in February. The inaugural series will feature four courses taught by members of the Mount Marty College faculty

and staff. Topics covered include: "What are Teenagers Reading?", Dr. Janis Hausmann; "The Gospels", Fr. Thomas Wordekemper; "World War II: Strategy and Legacy", Dr. Richard Lofthus; and "Film Literacy", S. Cynthia Binder. Courses will meet on the Mount Marty College Campus.

An informational session will be held at 2:30 p.m. Sunday, Feb. 5, at the Cyber Café in the Roncalli building of the Mount Marty College campus. Course instructors will be available at the event and those attending the information session will be given first opportunity to register.

The instructors for the Center for Active Learners are:

• Father Thomas Wordekemper — Father Thomas has been a Benedictine monk of Assumption Abbey, Richardton, N.D., since 1985. He holds MDiv. and MA in Catholic Thought from St. Meinrad School of Theology, St. Meinrad, Ind. Throughout his years as a monk, he has held many positions including kitchen manager, baker, organist/choir director, vocation director, campaign and development director, landscaper, weekend pastoral help in many parishes. Currently, he serves as the chaplain for Sacred Heart Monastery and Mount Marty College.

• Dr. Janis Hausmann — Hausmann is an associate professor of English and director of the Center for Academic Excellence at Mount Marty College. Prior to receiving her PhD in English with emphases on 20th Century American Literature and Composition and Rhetoric from the University of South Dakota, Hausmann taught high school as well as college courses, so adolescent literature has long been an interest of hers. During the last five years, she has also focused on literature of the Holocaust, and this spring she will join

a group sponsored by the Holocaust Educators Network of New York on what will be a memorable trip to Poland and Israel.

• Dr. Richard Lofthus — Lofthus is a North Dakota native and received his BA, BS, MA and DA degrees from the University of North Dakota. A professor of history at Mount Marty College, he also serves as the Faculty Athletic Representative. He is a member of the South Dakota State Historical Society, Yankton Country Historical Society and Phi Alpha Theta. Lofthus teaches a variety of history courses and specializes in 20th century American history. He is an avid photographer and makes wide usage of films and images in his teaching. Next month, he will have an exhibit of his photography entitled "What a Wonderful World" on display in the Bede Art Gallery at Mount Marty College. Sister Cynthia Binder — Binder, a native of Yankton and an alumna of both Mount Marty

High School and Mount Marty College, has taught French, English and film classes at MMC for many years. For the past 22 years she has also been an instructor for MMC's two-year degree program at the Yankton Federal Prison Camp. She holds a BA degree from Mount Marty College and MA degrees from the University of South Dakota and Georgetown University, as well as a diploma from New York University's Paris Program. Binder has taken MMC students and adults from the surrounding area to Europe for many years for annual study abroad seminars. In addition to her abroad program she has also conducted foreign film series to the area at MMC and with her campus film classes she has presented various film series at the prison compound for the past 18 years.


