


fit from the OUEST collaborative has been the ability to share best practices with the other hospitals.

'We have access to hospitals nationally that are working on common goals and trying to develop those best processes regardless of where they are located in the nation," she said. "We trial things and share our stories, and they share their stories, so we can say, 'Yeah, that would work better for our facility. Let's try that.' We also share what we've found so that we can not only impact patients here locally, but also help improve processes for facilities throughout the nation.'

Sharing those processes has allowed ASHH to make improvements in several areas, Guenther said.

"We have looked at internal processes on certain key measures — for example, reducing the time it takes us to get antibiotics to our patients by looking at the processes internally with pharmacy and nursing, or with diagnostics, lab and radiology to ensure that we can diagnose as quickly as possible to start those therapeutic processes," she said.

care has made a difference not only for ASHH, but also for hundreds of hospitals nationwide.

"For the members that are participating, mortality rate has been lowered 5 percent," she said. "And the evidence-based care that has been given truly does reduce the need for readmission and reduces complications for the patients.'

In 30 months, QUEST members saved 25.235 lives and reduced healthcare spending by \$2.85 billion. In addition, member costs for inpatient care have increased only 4 percent, compared to a national cost increase of 21 percent.

These hospitals challenged themselves to overcome process failures and excessive costs by measuring themselves against each other to drive success," Premier President and CEO Susan DeVore said in a news release. "Avera Sacred Heart Hospital is a true standard setter for top quality care in America, as they support the health of people in their community."

With the success ASHH has had with the QUEST collaborative, Guenther said the hospital will continue with the project on an ongoing basis.

'We will continue to enhance those processes we've worked on in the past, as well as continue to look at new areas of patient safety and additional outcomes and other things we can improve upon," she said.

Two Eagles To Hold **Book Signing Feb. 2**

Ihanktowan Dakotah Oyate (Yankton Sioux Tribe) member Vince Two Eagles will be signing copies of his recently-released 156-page book, "The Rez of the Story," at the Yankton Community Library at 2-7 p.m. Thursday, Feb. 2.

During the book signing, Two Eagles will also be speaking about the symbolism represented in his book cover and additional symbols in Native American culture.

A resident of Wagner and the Yankton Indian Reservation there, Two Eagles has been producing a weekly column for more than three years for his local newspaper, The Wagner Post. The column grew out of ongoing efforts of the Wagner community to improve communication between the community's Native American and non-native residents.

Two Eagles' book includes a collection of his first year's columns, which address topics such as what it means to be native, a Native American perspective on being "traditional" and reflections on the impact of Native American experiences in boarding schools. His work also skillfully addresses issues such as stereotyping, the benefits of diversity and the origin of some common terms such as "Red Man."

Two Eagles' current column is being featured in the Yankton Press & Dakotan.
