the importance of federal aid. The students will take part in a question-and-answer session about the video on Feb. 27 to share how they battle stereotypes.

School, also is going to Washington. She said she wants people to understand that she and other American Indian students don't need money or possessions for a rich life. Colombe is featured in the video with the word "honesty" written on her arm.

'I think we wanted to make this video and needed to, because what the other people — the outsiders — they don't know is that us Natives, we choose to live a certain way and we never wanted all this poverty. We just live our lives happily ... We see ourselves rich," she

Colombe said the stereotypes about American Indians used to bother her, but she has learned to focus on herself and the positives.

"I focus on sports, school, focus on graduating. It really keeps me going, taking that leadership role and moving forward, basically believing in myself and knowing I'm

capable of it," she said. ABC has not responded to an email seeking comment about the students' video.

Elwood, who has worked in American Indian education for about 10 years, said the video is helping to change perceptions.

We want people to know outside the reservation system that we have great kids here and they have a lot of potential and have the means to do great things," he said.


