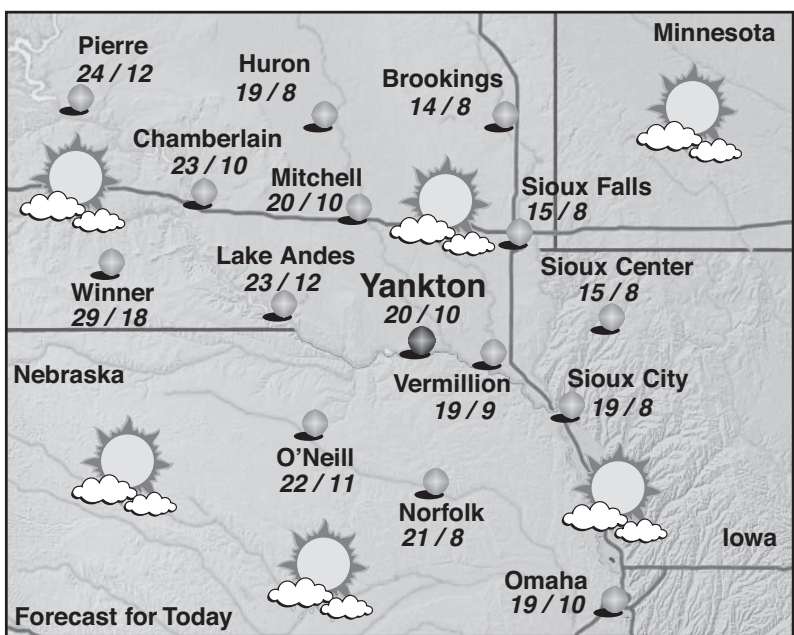

occurrence, he will run into a star or two, as well. "There was a point where I was in the recording studio with Beyonce," he said. "I try not to get too excited about that sort of thing, but it was really cool." Most of all, Giganti said he likes being able to see the product he worked with on screen, whether it's on television or in the theaters. "It's very rewarding to be part of that creative process," he said. Giganti said he first became interested in that process while at Yankton High School. While he

originally pursued journalism, film editing became his passion during his junior year, he said. "I got a camera and a computer I could edit on, and I got to see how the whole thing comes together," he said. "I thought, 'If I could do this and get paid to do it, how amazing would that be?'" Giganti added that the education he received while in Yankton played an important role in his development. "Being in an environment that allowed me to be creative and express my ideas really nurtured me to be who I am, even more than college," he said. "It really got me to where I am today." Giganti later attended the Johnny Carson School of Theatre and Film at the University of Nebraska in Lincoln to further his education.

Following graduation, he was faced with a decision. "Growing up in the Midwest, you kind of have to make a choice with the film industry," Giganti said. "Do you want to live and work in New York or L.A.? Those are the two capitals of the industry." He said he chose New York City because not only does he have family in the state, but he also saw the city as a creative inspiration. "It typifies the melting pot of America, being so diverse," he said. "It provides so many opportunities culturally to experience different things, and I think creative people can feed on that diversity." Giganti is scheduled to continue working on "Treme" until May, when he will again look for more work. He said that while working freelance is exciting, it can also be nerve-wracking with the

uncertainty of finding another job. "It's the life of it, but I've been lucky," he said. "The industry in New York is doing really well right now. I wasn't there during the financial crisis in 2008, but a lot of people I work with were, and they said it was tough. So hopefully, everything stays like it is and we keep getting work." Giganti added that while he hopes to one day move up from assistant editor to editor, he isn't taking what he gets to do now for granted. "It's been good to me, and I've enjoyed every moment of it," he said. "At the end of the day, it's not like we're saving lives or anything. It's just fun. Hearing on the injunction has been set before Judge C. Puckett on January 17. Questions upon which the injunction proceedings are based are whether the election was legally held and whether the required bond issue would not exceed the constitutional limit of 5 per cent of valuation.
