

Blood Drive Competition Slated For Jan. 14

VERMILLION — Vermillion Law Enforcement and Fire Department will compete to see which department can recruit the most blood donors for the community's blood supply during the seventh annual "Heroes Behind the Badges."

This fun competition between the departments will be held on Monday, Jan. 14, running from 10 a.m.-1 p.m. and 2:30-6:30 p.m. at Sanford Medical Center Vermillion.

The mobile unit will be parked at the Administration entrance on Plum Street. The public is encouraged to participate and designate their blood donation in honor of the department of their choice. The department with the most donations will receive the traveling trophy and bragging rights for the year.

"Through the years this event has helped hundreds of patients in the community during the time of year when blood supply is in urgent need," states Ken Versteeg, Executive Director, Community Blood Bank. "In the last week of 2012 and the first week of 2013 we have seen a marked increase in blood usage by 15 percent, placing a strain on the blood supply. This challenge between the departments provides the public a chance to say 'thank you' to the Law Enforcement and Fire personnel and make a significant impact in many lives in the Vermillion community."

Donors must be at least 17 years old (16 years old with a signed parent consent form), weigh 110 lbs or more and be in good general health. It is recommended that a person eat and drink plenty of fluids prior to donating blood. Please bring an ID with you at the time of donation. The vice president later huddled privately with the NRA and other gun owner groups for more than 90 minutes. Participants in the meeting described it as an open and frank discussion, but one that yielded little movement from either side on long-held positions.

Richard Feldman, the president of the Independent Firearm Owners Association, said all were in agreement on a need to keep guns out of the hands of criminals and people with mental health issues. But when the conversation turned to broad restrictions on high capacity magazines and assault weapons, Feldman said Biden suggested the president had already made up his mind to seek a ban.

"Is there wiggle room and give?" Feldman said. "I don't know."

White House officials said the vice president didn't expect to win over the NRA and other gun groups on those key issues. But the administration was hoping to soften their opposition in order to rally support from pro-gun lawmakers on Capitol Hill.

Biden's proposals are also expected to include recommendations to address mental health care and violence on television and in movies and video games. Those issues have wide support from gun rights groups and pro-gun lawmakers.

The vice president also met Thursday with representatives

from the entertainment industry, including Comcast Corp. and the Motion Picture Association of America. He'll hold talks Friday with the video game industry.

During his meeting with sporting and wildlife groups, Biden said that while no recommendations would eliminate all future shootings, "there has got to be some common ground, to not solve every problem but diminish the probability that our children are at risk in their schools and diminish the probability that firearms will be used in violent behavior in our society."

As the meetings took place in Washington, a student was shot and wounded at a rural California high school and another student was taken into custody.

Biden also talked about holes in NICS — the National Instant Criminal Background Check Sys-

tem — when states don't relay information to the database used by dealers to check purchasers. Advocates blame Congress for not fully funding a law that provides money to help states send records to the database.

Gun control backers see plenty of room for executive action when it comes to improving background checks and other areas.

For example, advocates say Obama could order the Justice Department to prosecute more people flagged by background checks as prohibited purchasers when they try to buy guns; expand a rule that requires dealers to notify the Bureau of Alcohol Tobacco Firearms and Explosives when someone tries to buy multiple semiautomatic rifles, a program now confined to Mexico border states, and increase enforcement actions at gun shows.

million addition at Trinity Lutheran Church and the \$605,000 expansion of the National Field Archery Association facility.

Other commercial activity included the Neighborhood Dental building, the Christ the King Lutheran Church expansion, Hausman Self Storage, Olson Self Storage, the City of Yankton maintenance hangar and a Kolet-

zky Implement project.

"I'm optimistic about commercial activity in 2013," Morrow said. "Among the projects being discussed is a 50-unit motel being proposed at the corner of 23rd Street and Green Street and Yankton Area Progressive Growth's spec building."

Damage from the August 2011 hail storm was still a source of a lot of construction activity in 2012. The city issued 709 permits for shingle, window and siding projects valued at more than \$8 million.

"We'll probably see a little bit of that continue into next year," Morrow said.

Residential remodels and additions were valued at \$588,000. Building of single-family homes declined for the sixth year in a row and amounted to a dozen in 2012. It's the lowest number of homes built in the community in records going back to 1993. A peak of 54 homes was reached in 2004.

The average value of those homes decreased from \$182,900 in 2011 to \$178,483 in 2012.

"I'm optimistic we'll do better this year and build a few more houses," Morrow stated. "Interest rates continue to hold, which I think will help the contractors." However, there were increases

in other types of housing during the past year. With the building of the Ability Building Services facility, the number of nursing home, assisted living or congregate home living units climbed from zero in 2011 to six in 2012.

Also, a dozen town home living units were built in 2012, double the number built in the previous year.

"Those are, for all practical purposes, single-family homes," Morrow said. "They are very popular with people who are down-sizing."
