2012 elections — \$16.8 million through its political action committee and nearly \$7.5 million through its affiliated Institute for Legislative Action. Separately, the NRA spent some \$4.4 million through July 1 to lobby Congress. Keene insists the group represents its members and not just the gun manufacturers, though he said the NRA would like industry to contribute more money to the association.

the standard was 80 feet between the lateral lines emptying into tile mains. Now most of the lateral lines are either 40 or 60 feet apart," Don Blazek said.

Gene Blazek said the demand for ag tile has created a backlog for contractors, encouraging many farmers to buy specialized tile plows that enable them to tile their own fields.

"They have the money. They have slack time after harvest. They already have the big tractors required to pull the tile plows," he said

Although tiling contractors gen-erally regret the advent of do-ityourself tile installation. Blazek said farmers can do a good job "if they know what they are doing.3

She attended school at the Struer State Gymnasium, matriculating in May 1942. She then

commenced working for a Danish law firm in Copenhagen. She continued in this position until May 1946.

In May 1946 she was hired by the Civilian Censorship Division of the United States Department of the Army, and she left for the American zone of occupied Germany. Her work focused on American efforts to locate Nazis still within Germany. During her time in Germany from 1946 until 1953. she lived in Esslingen, Frankfurt, Mannheim and Feudenheim. Ultimately, she met and married Harold Reinschmidt, a former GI and Wagnerite who stayed after the European end to the war in May 1945 to also work for the American occupation force.

Harold and Else married on July 16, 1948 in Frankfurt, Germany, by the German mayor of Frankfurt. Harold and Else were then married in Struer, Denmark, in a religious ceremony a few days later. Ultimately, they decided to return to the United States to farm, arriving in Wagner, South Dakota in 1953. They farmed on the river bottom south of Wagner from 1953 until 1991. She and Harold worked extremely hard on the farm and ranch. Starting with land they purchased while still in Germany, they built a farm and ranch in southern Charles Mix County. In 1991, they retired and moved to Yankton.

During their many years as farmers, Else was active in the community, including in her church, St. John's Lutheran Church, VFW Ladies Auxiliary, as well as her eight year term as a Wagner School Board member from 1976-1984.

Else was an avid reader, which she passed on to her children. Else embroidered exquisite pillows and works of art during her lifetime. Else was a classical music enthusiast, loved to sing and could listen to classic saxophone for hours. She was a devoted member of St. John's Lutheran church in Wagner and later St. John's Lutheran church in Yankton. She played piano at home, sang in the church choir and also was a member of the bell choir. Be-
