Jason Dilges, the governor's budget director, said lawmakers will be asked to add \$3.2 million in one-time money to this year's budget to get some programs started, and another \$4.1 million in additional ongoing spending will be proposed for next year's state budget.

In addition, the judicial system would get more than \$700,000 next year to expand existing special courts that handle drug and alcohol offenders in the Black Hills, Sioux Falls, Yankton and other areas.

Gilbertson said South Dakota was the last state to start the special courts about five years ago. The courts keep people out of prison by putting them in intensive supervision and drug and alcohol treatment. The state's current drug and alcohol courts have a success rate of about 80 percent, the chief justice said.

The state Department of Social Services will get extra money to expand existing substance abuse and other treatment programs in communities. Extra money also will be available to those counties to cover additional spending on jails and law enforcement because of the increase of offenders on probation.

Argenyi was an infant when he began using hearing aids for his disability, court records say, but his parents primarily communicated with him through spoken language. Argenyi does not know sign language, relying instead on "cued speech," which uses hand signals to distinguish sounds that appear the same on a speaker's

lips. While an undergraduate student at Seattle University in Washington state, Argenyi used a system that transcribes spoken words into text on a computer screen. With the help of that system and a cued speech interpreter — both of which were provided by Seattle University - Argenyi graduated in 2008 with a 3.87 GPA.

The lawsuit says Creighton did provide some assistance, such as a system in which professors wore a microphone that emitted frequencies to be picked up by Argenvi's cochlear implants. But Argenvi said the system was not adequate to accommodate his hearing disability, and one doctor determined it actually reduced

Johnson: Gun Legislation Must Be Individualized

SIOUX FALLS (AP) — U.S. Sen. Tim Johnson says it's important that any gun control legislation is tailored for each state as much as possible.

The Democratic senator says he opposes any one-size-fits-all approach to gun control legislation.

Johnson says that South Dakota has far fewer problems with guns than states like New York and New Jersey.

He says any bill introduced should be comprehensive and include measures on gun control, mental health, background checks and more.

Johnson says he is awaiting a set of 19 executive proposals to be released by President Barack Obama on Wednesday. Obama will release the steps a little over a month since the massacre of 20 children and six adults at Sandy Hook Elementary School in Newtown, Conn.

Requests For Concealed Carry Permits Up

PIERRE (AP) - South Dakota's Secretary of State Jason Gant says he has seen a "significant increase" in the number of requests for permits to carry a concealed weapon in recent months.

Gant says more than 3,000 concealed pistol permits have been requested in the first 11 days of 2013. This far outpaces 2012's tally of about 18,000. In 2011, nearly 15,800 permits were requested.

Gant says the total number of active permits in the state as of Jan. 11 is more than 65.000.

The shooting last month at a Newtown, Conn., elementary school that left 26 dead has helped spark a national debate on gun control.

This in turn has been cited as the reason behind a national surge in gun sales and concealed weapons permits.





expansion of who should get flu shots. During the terrible 2003-04 season, flu shots were only advised for children ages 6 months to 2 years.

That didn't help 4-year-old Amanda Kanowitz, who one day in late February 2004 came home from preschool with a cough and died less than three days later. Amanda was found dead in her bed that terrible Monday morning, by her mother.

'The worst day of our lives," said her father, Richard Kanowitz, a Manhattan attorney who went on to found a vaccine-promoting group called Families Fighting Flu.

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention gradually expanded its flu shot guidance, and by 2008 all kids 6 months and older were urged to get the vaccine. As a result, the vaccination rate for kids grew from under 10 percent back then to around 40 percent today.

Flu vaccine is also much more plentiful. Roughly 130 million doses have been distributed this season, compared to 83 million back then. Public education seems to be better, too, Kanowitz observed.

The last unusually bad flu season for children, was 2009-10 — the year of the new swine flu, which hit young people especially hard. As of early January 2010, 236 flu-related deaths of kids had been reported since the previous August.
