expansion of who should get flu shots. During the
terrible 2003-04 season, flu shots were only ad-
vised for children ages 6 months to 2 years.
That didn't help 4-year-old Amanda Kanowitz,
who one day in late February 2004 came home
from preschool with a cough and died less than
three days later. Amanda was found dead in her
bed that terrible Monday morning, by her
mother.
"The worst day of our lives," said her father,
Richard Kanowitz, a Manhattan attorney who
went on to found a vaccine-promoting group
called Families Fighting Flu.
The Centers for Disease Control and Preven-
tion gradually expanded its flu shot guidance,
and by 2008 all kids 6 months and older were
urged to get the vaccine. As a result, the vaccina-
tion rate for kids grew from under 10 percent
back then to around 40 percent today.
Flu vaccine is also much more plentiful.
Roughly 130 million doses have been distributed
this season, compared to 83 million back then.
Public education seems to be better, too,
Kanowitz observed.
The last unusually bad flu season for children,
was 2009-10 — the year of the new swine flu,
which hit young people especially hard. As of
early January 2010, 236 flu-related deaths of kids
had been reported since the previous August.

Criminal System Changes Could Save S.D. \$162M

PIERRE — South Dakota could save an estimated \$162 million in the next decade if it adopts a plan to improve the rehabilitation of convicted criminals by treating more nonviolent offenders outside prison walls, a state official told lawmakers Tuesday.
If nothing is done to stem a rapid in-crease in the number of adult inmates, the state could spend an additional \$212 million to build and operate two new prisons in the next 10 years, said Jim Se-ward, Gov. Dennis Daugaard's legal counsel.
Using intensive probation and parole along with special courts for drug and al-cohol offenders would cost an estimated \$51 million over 10 years — nearly \$162 million less than the cost of building and running two new prisons over the same time period, Seward said.
A panel appointed by Daugaard, Supreme Court Chief Justice David Gilbertson and legislative leaders recom-mended the proposed changes in South Dakota's criminal justice system. The proposal was the centerpiece of Dau-gaard's State of the State address to the Legislature last week, and Gilbertson talked about the importance of drug and alcohol courts when he delivered his State of the Judiciary speech.

A bill on the issue will get a hearing later this session in a Senate committee, but Seward and other officials on Tues-day briefed the Legislature's Joint Ap-propriations Committee on the plan and its projected costs.
South Dakota's adult inmate popula-tion grew from fewer than 550 inmates in 1977 to more than 3,600 last year, out-pacing the national growth rate. In No-vember, the state had 3,206 male inmates and 417 female inmates. The study panel reported that South Dakota has 416 inmates for every 100,000 peo-ple, far higher than the average impris-onment rate of 307 per 100,000 in the neighboring six states.
If South Dakota continues to lock up offenders at the current rate, the adult prison population will increase by an es-timated 900 people in the next decade, the study panel estimated. That would require a new women's prison in about three years and a new men's prison by 2020, officials have said.
Seward said the plan for South Dakota includes changes already proven in other states. In the past decade, 17 states lowered their imprisonment rates and overall crimes rates, he said.
Seward and other officials said South Dakota can do a better job of rehabilitat-ing inmates through intensive supervi-sion and treatment outside of prison.

Federal Appeals Panel: Deaf Med Student Can Sue

OMAHA, Neb. (AP) — A jury should be allowed to decide a deaf medical school student's discrimination lawsuit against Creighton University in Omaha, a federal appeals court panel said Tuesday.
A three-judge panel of the 8th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals said a lower federal court should not have granted the private Jesuit university's motion for sum-mary judgment to dismiss Michael Argenyi's lawsuit.
Argenyi was accepted to Creighton's medical school in 2008 after disclosing on his application that he was hearing-impaired. Argenyi requested certain accom-modations for his disability to allow him to follow lectures, participate in labs and communicate with patients.
Argenyi was an infant when he began using hearing aids for his disability, court records say, but his parents primarily communicated with him through spoken lan-guage. Argenyi does not know sign language, relying in-stead on "cued speech," which uses hand signals to distinguish sounds that appear the same on a speaker's lips.
While an undergraduate student at Seattle Univer-sity in Washington state, Argenyi used a system that transcribes spoken words into text on a computer screen. With the help of that system and a cued speech interpreter — both of which were provided by Seattle University — Argenyi graduated in 2008 with a 3.87 GPA.
The lawsuit says Creighton did provide some assis-tance, such as a system in which professors wore a mi-crophone that emitted frequencies to be picked up by Argenyi's cochlear implants. But Argenyi said the sys-tem was not adequate to accommodate his hearing dis-ability, and one doctor determined it actually reduced Argenyi's ability to understand his professors.

pick up a package at St. George Catholic Church, and there was an en-velope at the church, two years ago." And then came the third time.
"This time, it was hand delivered by one of our postmen," Alvey said. "He brought it with the mail and deliv-ered it to me personally with the nor-mal priority mail."
The three packages, while deliv-ered differently, contain the same amount of money and envelopes. In addition, the last note contains refer-ences to the school schedule and to details in previous letters.
In addition, the message remains the same in each letter, Alvey said.
"We suspect it's the same person," he said. "The latest letter is again ad-dressed to me, and it talks about knowing the good in the world, and that God knows all."
The anonymous donor urged the students to take a "pay it forward" ap-proach to their newfound wealth, Alvey said.
"Santa" encouraged the students to keep doing good things with the money and passing on their good for-

tune to others," he said.
Alvey met with the elementary stu-dent council, informing the members of the situation regarding the kindergarten.
"The student council members wanted to honor all of the classes," he said. "In the spirit of the (donor's) gift, they voted to pay for a party for the kindergarten class so they would ben-efit from the gift's intentions."
With the issue resolved, Alvey as-sembled the elementary students to announce the \$1,000 gift and its purpose.
The envelopes were distributed, but Alvey wanted the moment to be-come more than just passing out cash to the students. The staff asked stu-dents to do good things with the money.
"We hope to follow up with the kids in a few weeks and put together some kind of journal," he said. "We are shooting for including it in our newsletter at the end of January, where we interview kids on how the money was spent."
The gift has already resulted in good things, Alvey said.
"One of the kids in third grade put the money into his lunch account so his mom wouldn't have to pay for his meals," he said.
Such unselfish acts have actually

become quite common with past gifts, Alvey said.
"Over the years, the kids have done something nice to benefit some-body in their family, or they have saved it up to do something bigger that would honor the secret gift," he said. "We have kids who have given their gift to charitable events, and a number of them talked about buying gifts for their family. I think it's up to the imagination of the students."
The "Secret Santa" gave the \$1,000 as a reward as much as a gift, Alvey said.
"In the first two letters, it referred to the fact that he noticed us (with ar-ticles) in the papers," he said. "He just wanted us (as a school) to remember that people are always watching us to do good things."
Alvey appreciates the attention and positive feedback from "Secret Santa" even if no more money comes the school's way.
"All in all, it's just really special to be part of it," he said. "It's nice to know someone is so generous in the community and is watching us. Obvi-ously, he likes what he sees happening."
