Debts: Responsible After Death?

Dear Dave,
My daughter died. She was 32 years old and single, and she had lived with me for the last few years because she was recently disabled. I did not support her financially, and when she died she had no assets and no will. Is it my responsibility to pay the student loans and medical bills she left behind?

Dear Jim,
I'm so sorry you're experiencing this kind of grief. Losing a child is a heartbreaking experience, no matter their age.

The short answer is this: If you didn't sign for it, you're not liable. If a friend were to move in with you, that doesn't make you responsible for their debts. The fact that it was an adult family member doesn't matter either. She was a legal adult who signed her name

on the debts in question.

If I were in your shoes, I'd try to find any papers attached to these debts and make copies of them. Then, I'd write up a form letter stating the total debt amount and the fact that she died with no assets. By doing this you're notifying them that she passed away, and they're not going to be paid. There's no will or estate to be probated, so they can close the accounts.

Doing this will make creditors aware of the situation, and it should also protect you from getting hammered with collection calls. But the creditors get nothing in this kind of situation.

those right here at home to maintain the wonderful services the YWCC provides in this community," she said. "This fundraiser is giving community members an opportunity to contribute to the large scale of services we provide each year."

FVC Coordinator Lyndsay Evans added that her agency, which provides on-site supervised visits for families, needs more funding in order to keep up with the demand for its services. Currently, the FVC can only accommodate one family at a time, she said.

"Our numbers have increased so much over the last few months, without any sign of letting up, that it is necessary to be able to provide simultaneous visits so that two of our families are able to utilize the facility at the same time," Evans said. "It is heartbreaking to have to tell a mom or dad that they are not going to be able to have a visit

with their babies because I am not able to provide the space in the schedule for them because we only have one set of equipment."

In addition to serving as a fundraiser, Warren-Johnson said the dinner theatre/auction will also be used as part of the YWCC's continued effort to spread awareness of its services.

"The shelter provides an invaluable service to our community — keeping members of our community safe in a comfortable homelike environment," she said. "Our advocates work daily to help victims in safety planning and the healing process. Our goal for each victim is to help them to find stability and independence in their life. In 2012 we helped 76 individuals through the shelter program find this independence and self-confidence. We also provided support services to hundreds of community members through the year."

"Heart to Heart With the Yankton Women's/Children's Center" will begin with a social hour at 5:30 p.m. Saturday, Feb. 9. A steak dinner will follow, accompanied by a mystery theatre per-

formance in which the audience will help solve the crime.

The night will also feature live music, as well as silent and live auctions. Auction items include a Hawaiian getaway, diamond pendant, plane ride, dollhouse, hunting lodge trip, doghouse, quilt, lake party and various desserts.

Warren-Johnson encourages anyone interested in supporting the YWCC to attend the fundraiser, as every contribution helps.

"If just a single person purchased a ticket, that would ensure that we have a support group for a week at the shelter," she said. "If someone wanted to buy two tickets and take their valentine on a date, those two tickets purchased would ensure our crisis hotline would be available for an entire weekend. Every ticket purchased is really supporting some sort of service we are providing for victims and survivors and children."

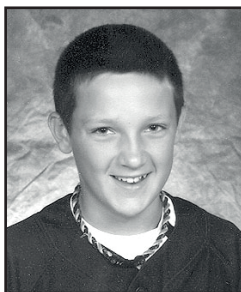

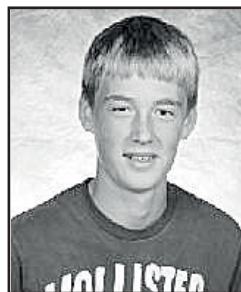
